MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION PROTESTS AGAINST ACTION OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY

Of Boise in Enforcing Sunday Law Against Passion Play Exhibition By Y M C A

The Ministerial association of Boise held a special meeting at the Y. M. C. A. rooms for the purpose of discussing and of taking action relative to the action of County Attorney Koelsch in refusing to permit the production of the moving picture exhibition at the Y. M. C. A. rooms Sunday afternoon as a part of the regular services for the day.

It is understood that some of the ministers present expressed themselves most forcibly upon the matter, as a result of which the following official statement of their action was prepared and submitted to the press for publication:

Boise, Ida., Dec. 30, 1907.

At a meeting of the Ministerial association of Boise held at the Y. M. C. A. rooms at 10:30 today to consider the action of the county attorney in prohibiting the giving of the Passion Play at the regular afternoon service for men at the Y. M. C. A., the following consensus of opinion was reached:

1. We find no clause in the Sunday rest law which prohibits such representation on the part of a Christian organization. We are unanimous in the opinion that the county attorney made a mistake. We do not judge his motive, but are thoroughly convinced that the effect of his action must be to bring contempt upon the Sunday Rest law.

2. We maintain that we have the sacred right to worship God according to the dictates of our conscience and that such worship cannot

be confounded with vaudeville performances, and that if others discriminate between an act of worship, and such performances, we regard that as having nothing to do with the law in the case.

3. We deprecate the fact that the county attorney held a meeting over the directors of the Y. M. C. A. in that though he would not make an arrest if they proceeded yet would allow the theaters to run this religious service was carried out as intended.

4. We also recall the fact that County Attorney Koelsch made statement at a meeting held months ago in the Y. M. C. A. rooms that he would close the "entrance in the alley 'before snow flies'" and that we are credibly informed that this promise has never been fulfilled and that we as a body feel that there is such a broad field of activity in this direction and others, that if he would zealously enter it would have no time to interfere with religious services and misinterpret the Sunday law, which is explicit in itself.

5. We heartily endorse the action of the directors of the Y. M. C. A. in surrendering voluntarily right which they know themselves to possess, in order to avoid a result as that threatened by the county attorney, viz., that he would allow the places inhabited by the Sunday Rest law to be opened on Sunday.
