THE CITY TREASURER REPORTS

Jan. 3, 1908.

THE CITY TREASURERS To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council, City of Salem, Oregon:

Gentlemen: I herewith submit a statement of the balances on hand in the several funds, at the end of the quarter ending December 31, 1907.

The statement shows that the amount of cash on hand at the time of the last report, October 1, 1907, was \$9971.99. The receipts from all sources since that time have been \$20,882.16, and the disbursements \$22,873.80, leaving a balance on hand to the amount of \$7980.35.

There are outstanding general fund warrants endorsed "Not paid for want of funds" to the amount of \$2642.14. These will have been called before this report reaches your honorable body, and there will still be a balance left applicable to the payment of a part, at least, of the warrants drawn for the month of December, 1907; leaving a sufficient amount on hand to protect the payment of interest due on various bonds as it accrues.

I would call your attention at this time, to the fact that the books of the city treasurer have never been audited since I took the office in January, 1905. In justice to the city, my bondsmen and myself, I respectfully request that you give the matter your attention at your earliest convenience.
