

MINISTER TABOOS REVIVALS

SPRINGS SENSATION

EPISCOPALIAN DIVINE GETS FUNNY OVER THE IDEA OF TOO MUCH RELIGION BEING WORSE THAN NONE AT ALL.

Walla Walla, Wash., Jan. 8.—Rev. Grand Andreas Bard, a poet and dramatist of considerable reputation, a well known speaker all over the Northwest for his eloquence and power, and rector of the St. Paul's Episcopal church of Walla Walla has created a sensation unparalleled in ecclesiastical history of the Pacific Northwest, when in a reply to a request for an interview of the subject of "revivals," for a Walla Walla paper, he jarred the brethren in his church by declaring his unqualified opposition to them as an Episcopalian. The subject of the advisability of the old fashioned soul storming revival has recently become a mooted one in Walla Walla, and the cause of considerable acrimonious debate. Bard declared:

"Everybody knows that Episcopalianism stand in awe of revivalism. It is easier to imagine Bismarck wearing a Jacobines cap or Czar Nicholas managing a variety show than to see the august congregation of St. Paul's occupying a mourner's bench in the tabernacle. To the majority of the Episcopalian there is but one thing worse than 'no religion,' and this is 'too much religion.' Talmage, Spurgeon and Moody were specialists on the geography of Gehenna and crowded the auditorium. The Unitarian church on the other hand is holding ground while the Episcopalian denomination manages to keep alive by social prestige and trills of fashion. For successful evangelism, give a shouting hell fire preacher with a P. T. Barnum appendix.

"I will say for my flock, however, that they have a pretty church, good intentions, empty benches, classic music, fine millinery, no objection to smoking, no wandering boy tonight and a clergyman willing to be a scape goat."

GAMBLER FELL IN A DUEL

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—A duel to the death was fought yesterday in a Sansome street saloon between Frank Cochran, an old-time gambler, and Frank R. Bell, a young capitalist. When six shots had been exchanged Cochran fell dead in the arms of Charles Cadlem, the bartender, after stumbling over the unconscious form of his antagonist, which lay near the table, mortally pierced by three bullets. The tragic battle was caused by Bell's attention to Ella Cochran, the young and beautiful wife of the dead man.

The men at the corner of Market and Sansome streets, and, according to the story of Jesse Duryea, Bell's chauffeur, Cochran invited his enemy into Harry Elcheberger's saloon to talk over their differences. Retiring to a side room, the men seated themselves at a small table. A moment later Bell was heard to say: "You put your hands on the table, and I will do the same."

The silence that followed was shattered by the sharp cracking of revolvers, and after six shots rang out Bell fell to the floor.

Still clutching his smoking revolver, Cochran staggered over the prostrate form of his antagonist, advanced toward the middle of the saloon and fell dead in the arms of the bartender.

Bell lies at the Central Emergency hospital in a critical condition. Bell and Cochran are from Seattle. While Cochran, who was a fare dealer, was in Juneau, Alaska, Bell met a woman signing herself as Ella Cochran. Cochran later went to Goldfield, when Mrs. Cochran came to this city. Upon the return of Cochran to Seattle he learned that his wife had been in this city. He came here two weeks ago to kill Bell, and the attempt he made yesterday was fatal to himself.

It was Bell's ability to offer Ella Cochran the use of a machine that first attracted her attention. She met him in Seattle in front of a cheap theatre, and, after permitting him to entertain her, wrote to Cochran of the chance acquaintance.

WESTERN MINER HAS GELT

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 8.—Richard L. Coleman, of Tonopah, Nev., threw the working force of the Hotel Alexandria in a state of nervous collapse when he registered, tossed a buck handbag on the clerk's desk and quietly counted out 1500 twenty dollar gold pieces, or \$30,000, and asked that it be deposited in the vault. One of the strong boxes was filled with yellow coins, which are fresh from the San Francisco mint.

Coleman and his wife took rooms for the winter. He said he carried the money to close a mining deal. He is an extensive mine operator.

JAPANESE PROBLEM SERIOUS

Washington, Jan. 8.—The Japanese question seems to be growing bigger and more dangerous every day. It is the prevailing opinion that failure on the part of the United States to negotiate an exclusion treaty with Japan, and that the failure of congress to legislate upon the matter, would start more trouble.

President Roosevelt has held frequent conferences with the California and other Pacific coast delegates, and it is believed that he will not arrange a suitable exclusion treaty with Japan. The matter has been left in the President's hands for the present.

BLOODY ROW AT LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 8.—Urged by wild cries of "lynch him," a mad-dened mob, infuriated by his attacks on a drunken man, rushed F. Kanowa, a Japanese store keeper, into a doorway on Spring street last night, beat him up with kicks and blows and frightened him fairly into a faint; before Patrolman McCart was able to fight off the assailants, and get his skulking charge into a place of safety.

A Goldfield mine owner started the rumpus. He entered Kanowa's curio store, where an auction was in progress, and amused himself by bidding for articles, and then refusing to pay for them. This enraged Kanowa. Summoning two assistants, he threw the Goldfield man into the street. Spectators said that the Jap kicked the drunken man twice as the fellow lay on the ground. A crowd hurriedly assembled and rescued the miner. Passengers leaped from cars and joined in the cry for vengeance on the Jap. The brown man's companions escaped during the commotion, but Kanowa was cornered. The mob grew more menacing. They talked lynching, but had no rope. Then the policemen appeared and ended the affair.

TOKIO MAKING MOVES

Tokio, Jan. 8.—The local authorities have been instructed to submit monthly reports of the number of Japanese going to America, Hawaii, and Canada from Yokohama, Kobe and Nagasaki.

Washington, Jan. 8.—It is understood that the state department has been asked by the Japanese government if this country would offer any objection to the appointment of Ambassador Takahira, now stationed at Rome, as the successor to Ambassador Aoki at Washington. So far as known this move would be agreeable to the administration.

TOAD EATS FOR FIRST TIME IN A MILLION YEARS

Ancient Animal Found Buried in Limerock Gradually Coming Back to Life.

New York, Jan. 8.—Pythagoras, the toad, took his first meal in a million years Tuesday at the Bronx zoo. Four flies and an earthworm constituted the meal of the little black creature that had been buried for so many centuries in limestone rock 500 feet down in a silver mine at Butte, Mont. The ancient toad is slowly recovering his eyesight and the use of his limbs, and is gradually turning green again, as he was in the middle ages. He has already emitted several feeble sounds, but the croaks have not come back.

MAN KILLED BY ONE BLOW OF FIST.

Prescott, Ariz., Jan. 8.—Tim Monahan, shift boss at the United Verde smelter at Jerome, almost instantly killed Furnaceman Miller, with one blow of his fist yesterday. Monahan and Miller quarreled, the former struck the latter a blow on the point of the jaw, and then walked away. Miller walked to a nearby door, stood there a few minutes and then fell dead. Monahan is in custody, pending the finding of the coroner's jury.
