NOBLE CHARACTER DIES SUNDAY AT BAKER CITY

Father Heinrich, Well Known in Oregon, Where He Has Labored.

(From Daily Herald.) Rt. Rev. John Heinrich, vicar general of the diocese of Baker City, passed peacefully away at St. Elizabeth's hospital at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, surrounded by Bishop O'Reilly and the local clergy of the Cathedral parish. The funeral will be held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock from the pro-Cathedral and it is expected that a large delegation of the clergy will be present and assist at the services. The Very Rev. A. A. Bronsgwert of The Dalles will sing the mass and Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Reilly will deliver the eulogy of the departed.

Father Heinrich was one of the oldest and best known priests in the northwest and had lived in Oregon consecutively for 38 years. He was born in Austria 60 years ago and took his philosophical and theological studies at the American college at Louvain, Belgium. He came to Portland with Archbishop Blanchet and was ordained a priest of the archdiocese of Oregon. He was connected with the cathedral in Portland and was also superintendent of St. Michael's College for boys for several years. For 18 years he was stationed in Roseburg and the territory adjoining. Afterwards he served for several years as pastor of St. Francis church in East Portland and later on was appointed as superintendent of St. Mary's home for orphans at Beaverton, Ore.

Of late years he has been stationed in Baker City, where he was esteemed and loved by all who had the advantage of his acquaintance. Father Heinrich was a man of superior intellect and attainments; a linguist well acquainted with the principal languages spoken, and a historian and theologian. He was a man of splendid physique who feared no hardship, was charitable and kindly by nature and his generosity never permitted him to amass any of this world's wealth, but, like all generous natures, he was convinced that it was more blessed to give than to receive, and he gave cheerfully of his meager income. For more than two years he has been a patient at St. Elizabeth's hospital, suffering from a stroke of paralysis. He was kindly ministered to by the Sisters of St. Francis.

His death is greatly mourned by Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Reilly, who esteemed Father Heinrich for his noble qualities of mind and heart. Many telegrams and letters of condolence have been received by Bishop O'Reilly on the death of Father Heinrich.

Brought to the Asylum.

"I am not surprised. They stoned and persecuted Jesus Christ, why not me?" was the remark with which George Harmon received the information Friday that he was to be taken to the insane asylum at Salem on the following day. Continuing, Harmon said that he received "calls" from God and that when he was instructed to use the rod on his children he would have to obey.

In order to quell this obedience to "calls" the authorities found it necessary to place Harmon under arrest the early part of last week, after he had administered a horsewhipping to his three daughters, aged 19, 15 and 10, beating the eldest about the head and face with his fists, as related in the last issue of the Gazette.

The authorities say that Harmon was perfectly sane on any and all other topics, but that when religion was mentioned he was completely "off." He believed himself inspired by God to do as he did, he stated, and seemed to think the severe beatings that he had given his daughters were by divine direction.

The young women hope to keep the family together and the two oldest girls have secured employment. There are two smaller children besides the young ladies who were ill-treated by the father last week.

An attendant came up from Salem Friday evening and Harmon was taken to that city Saturday morning.—Corvallis Gazette.

Van Allen Won Suit.

After a brief deliberation in the action for money of W. H. Harding vs. C. T. Van Allen, the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. In this case Mr. Harding sued to gain possession of certain live stock and personal property which he claimed was wrongfully taken by Mr. Van Allen from a 40-acre farm which he had bought of the said defendant. Mr. Van Allen was the former owner of a 40-acre farm near Silverton and during last October traded the said real estate to Mr. Harding for the furniture and business of the Eldridge hotel in this city. Shortly after the deal had been made Mr. Van Allen, according to the testimony, removed certain live stock and personal property from the premises, which were left on the farm after Van Allen had vacated. The plaintiff claimed that the stock and personal property were included in the trade, while Mr. Van Allen declared that he traded nothing but the land and buildings.

In addition to declaring the defendant the rightful owner of the property in dispute, the jury also awarded damages to the amount of 10 cents.

William Kaiser and Tillman Ford were the attorneys for the plaintiff, while Attorney George Bingham represented the defense.

We doubt today the individual existence of Homer, and the authorship of Shakespeare's plays is questionable.

I have been at a loss to discover a novel or unusual thought in any of these. The origin of all things is ultra-human, and, in the last analysis, Homer and Shaw, Edison and Thales, Brahma and Mr. Eddy, only focus or reflect imperfectly the scattered rays of that ultimate and unimaginable sun, which perhaps is God."—Current Literature.
