## BUYING GROUND FOR DEPOT

### IS OREGON ELECTRIC

LARGE FORCE OF MEN EXTENDING SOUTHWARD—BANQUET TO BE GIVEN IN HONOR OF COMPLETION OF NEW LINE INTO CAPITAL CITY.

That the Oregon Electric Company intends to put its Salem-Portland line in operation at the very earliest date is substantiated by the manner the work is being rushed in every department of the road. Yesterday afternoon a large force of men arrived and were immediately set to work excavating at the corner of High and State streets for the "Y" which is to be used temporarily for a turn-table.

This morning workmen are busy at the corner of Mill and High digging holes on either side of the streets in which to place the poles, many of which are on the ground.

It has been reported that the quarter block just south of the Gile packing house, cornering on Mill and High, has been purchased by the company, and will be used for a depot location. This ground is but three blocks from State street, and is well situated, being near the Southern Pacific switch, which, should the freight depot be established here, would be an advantage. The space is probably the largest amount of ground obtainable within three blocks of State street, unless the property at the corner of Trade and High could be purchased. Mr. Smith, the owner of this property, is said to have had several propositions to sell, but so far no deal has been reported.

**Car Barn in Highland.**  
A new car barn will probably be erected in Highland by the company soon on block 31, North Highland and Elder streets, in Highland addition. While the barns have not been begun the ground has been purchased and citizens of that section report that actual construction work will begin soon. The barn will be 100x39.

**Will Banquet New Line.**  
At a meeting of the Board of Trade last evening a committee of three was appointed to look after the details of a banquet which it is proposed to give under the auspices of the board in the near future in honor of the opening of the new electric line between this city and Portland. The matter was referred to the executive committee. The Boosters' Club and the Business Men's League will be invited to attend, as well as the officials of the new electric line and of the Southern Pacific railroad. The date has not yet been set, but it will be on the day that the first complete train is run to this city on the electric line.
