BILLY HOFER TO RUN LINE OF STEAMBOATS

Famous Guide, Who Was Personal Friend of President Roosevelt, Gets Rich Concession in Yellowstone Park.

(Seattle Times, Jan. 6.)

Bearing a rich concession from the government which was given him by President Roosevelt as a Christmas present, T. E. Hofer, or as he is universally known, "Billy" Hofer, returned yesterday from Washington, D. C., and Old Forge, N. Y., where he recently took 18 beaver caught alive by him in Yellowstone Park. Hofer brings with him the sole rights and privileges of running a steamboat line on the lakes of Yellowstone Park, where he was President Roosevelt's special guide a few years ago at the time of the President's hunting trip in the park. The concession promises to be a rich one and Hofer has already made arrangements for five new steamboats which will be built at a cost of about \$25,000 and will be in operation next summer.

"Billy" always spends his winters in Seattle near the base of the clam supply and when he pulled into port yesterday his first rush was for the waterfront, where he eagerly began to question J. E. Standley, of Ye Olde Curiosity Shop, as to the clam crop this year. He heard only good news and it put him in the best of humor. He described his troubles with the beaver, four of whom died before he could get them disposed of in the Adirondack mountains, where they are to be preserved and increased if possible. Hofer took dinner with President Roosevelt while in Washington and together they reviewed the pleasures of the trip through Yellowstone.

The guide is also interested in a fox breeding island in Alaska known as Fox island.

O. R. & N. COMPANY IS STILL REDUCING ITS FORCE

Retrenchment is the order of the day on the O. R. & N., system and every day now marks the reduction of forces in some of the various departments.

The last stroke of economy made by the company was the laying off of 26 shop men from the shops at La Grande and the taking out of service of the steam shovel at the cut off west of the city. The shop force has been cut down to the number of men absolutely necessary to keep the engines in repair and no unnecessary repair work or new work of any kind is being done.

Wednesday morning the steam shovel which has been at work widening out the grade for the cut off west of Pendleton did not go to work and it is not known when the work will be resumed. The engine which has been used in the steam shovel train was sent to La Grande and the crew is in the city waiting for orders.

Recently the heavy rains in the Elgin district greatly damaged the new grade on the Wallows extension, but so far no repair work is being done on that and it is the opinion of the employes that but little work of any kind is being carried on during the winter months.
