

# DEMOCRATS WOULD EXCLUDE JAPANESE

Jump at the Chance to Make That a National Issue in Politics in the Coming Campaign

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, Jan. 10.—That one of the planks in the Democratic platform will frankly declare for Japanese exclusion in terms that will leave no doubt as to the attitude of the party towards that question became known today. The information comes from a source considered highly authentic, and follows an interview granted by William J. Bryan, in Chicago the other day, in which he declared he favored exclusion.

The impression is those who will have much to do with the framing of the Democratic platform took their cue from this statement, and began the building of a platform to meet Mr. Bryan's views on this subject. This is considered a shrewd move on the part of the leaders to coax the Pacific coast states into the ranks of the Democrats. It is said, also, that Bryan shares the belief of his advisers that an exclusion plank will win these states quicker than anything else.

# SENATOR FULTON MAY OPPOSE HIM

Big Fight Possible in the Senate Committee on Judiciary Over Confirmation of Chris Schuebel.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Believing that he could expect nothing but the most bitter opposition from Senator Fulton to the confirmation of Attorney Chris Schuebel, of Oregon City, as United States district attorney for Oregon, Senator Bourne attempted yesterday to secure the consent of the committee on judiciary of the senate to an immediate confirmation of Senator Fulton, who is a member of the committee, is now en route to Washington, speeding as fast as the limited can take him, in order to get to Washington to take a hand in the game. Fulton, who is a member of the judiciary committee, had evidently informed his colleagues of his wishes in regard to Schuebel, for and it is possible that he will not oppose Bourne and his request were turned down with perfect unanimity and dispatch, and the Schuebel nomination will be held up until Fulton arrives.

It is understood that some of Senator Fulton's friends at Salem, who protested against his recommendation of Bingham, are also uniting in Oregon, Senator Bourne attempted a protest against the confirmation of Schuebel. They will wire the senate to do all in his power to defeat confirmation of Schuebel by the judiciary committee, and, if not successful there, will take it before the senate. It will be a battle royal, in which to Roosevelt and Bourne will stake all known what Senator Fulton will do, as neither are known to be quitters. The boys became frightened at this evidence of the danger of their sport, and at once desisted from it.

# BOARD OF TRADE BANQUET

In Honor of the Oregon Electric's First High Class Electric Train Into the Capital City.

At the regular meeting of the Salem board of trade, held at their rooms, Mr. Deekbach was in the chair and considerable business of a routine nature was transacted.

The matter of the annual banquet was discussed and the executive committee was authorized to make this social event one of a broad, general character. The members of the Boosters' club, the Business Men's league, and the city council will be invited to participate. As outside guests, railroad officials, prominent citizens of Portland, Albany, Eugene and other valley towns will be asked to participate. A date will not be finally fixed until some further details are completed and disposed of.

A piece of work of a very important nature was taken up by the board which, it is believed, will result in great good. Upon motion the chair was asked to appoint a committee of three to act with like committees from the Boosters' and Business Men's league, to further the improvement and the paving of State and Twelfth streets to the Southern Pacific depot. The Boosters' and Business Men's league will be invited to appoint committees to cooperate in this work, and several very important moves for the betterment and development of Salem will be made to hinge upon the completion of this work.
