## CHAMPION OF THE ALMIGHTY DOLLAR

Prominent Man, Once the Advocats of Popular Rights, Has Fallen Into Evil Ways

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 10.—Chancellor E. Benjamin Andrews, of the University of Nebraska, is said to have placed his resignation in the hands of the regents of the institution to take effect at the pleasure of the board.

The report is that the resignation was brought about because of the unpopularity of the Chancellor's championship of Rockefeller and his

solicitation of endowment funds from the Standard Oil magnate.

President Andrews is on the pension list of the Rockefeller endowment fund and his future is provided for. Wm. McHugh, a clerk has been during the days of free silver, which cause he championed, and it was because of that championship that Bryan and the other silver people placed him at the head of the Nebraska Institution.

## OCTOGENARIAN WOMAN WANDERS FROM HOME

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 10.—Mrs. White, the octogenarian mother of Henry A. White, druggist, wandered from her son's home on Ellsworth street last evening, and has not been found. Her family and the police are both searching diligently for her.

White states that his mother, who is 80 years old and feeble, left home early in the evening, her departure being unnoticed at the time.

It is feared that Mrs. White has suffered some fall or other accident, as she is far from strong, and could not well have wandered far from home.

## JAPANESE LABOR IS OBJECTED TO

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Everett, Wash., Jan. 10.—A mass meeting was held in Arlington as a demonstration on the part of citizens against 45 Japanese laborers employed by mill men in that neighborhood. Prior to this meeting a petition had been circulated and signed by 187 residents requesting the employers to discharge the aliens. When interviewed by a committee the mill owners requested a delay until Saturday, to see if there is any way to cancel their contracts with the Japanese.

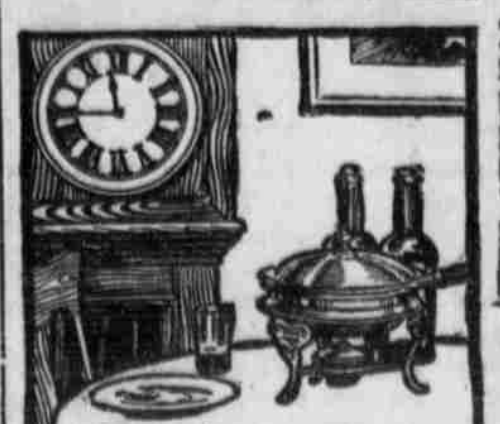
### Richest Woman in the World.

## LABOR HAS ITS RIGHTS

Martin's Ferry, O., Jan. 10.—The views of William H. Taft, secretary of war, in regard to the use and abuse of injunctions are stated in a letter in reply to questions propounded by Llewellyn Lewis, secretary of the Ohio Federation of Labor, given out here today. Mr. Taft prefaces his statement with a declaration that he believes it to be "highly beneficial and entirely lawful for laborers to unite in their common interests."

**Tackles Capital and Labor.**  
New York, Jan. 10.—Realizing that one of the strongest points against his candidacy is his supposed attitude on labor, Secretary Taft proposes to make his position clear at the outset of his campaign. He had intended to talk about the Philippines at Cooper Union tonight, but has changed the subject to "Capital and Labor."

Though no official announcement has been made, Assistant Postmaster-General Hitchcock is expected to take up the work of the Taft boom in the East and South on the completion of some departmental work.

### HOW HARRY ORCHARD SECURED IMMUNITY.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 10.—Attorneys who defended Haywood and Pettibone profess to have information to the effect that Harry Orchard was promised a reward of some kind between the Haywood and Pettibone trials. After the Haywood trial, they assert, Orchard became incensed because of the denunciation of him by Senator Borah, in his closing address for the prosecution, and said that he would never be a witness again in a case in which Borah appeared as an attorney. In order to secure his testimony against Pettibone it is said that the officials were forced to promise that he would not be required to suffer the extreme penalty for his crimes.
