Ulwin Denyer Appointed—
Ulwin Denyer was appointed administrator of the estate of Job Denyer, deceased, Saturday afternoon, after a trial which took up the greater part of the day. The controversy was between Ulwin Denyer and his sister, Tulle Osborn, over which should receive letters of administration, and was decided in favor of the former, owing to the fact that he had resided on the place almost continually and was supposed to be more familiar with the estate. The estate

is valued at \$8750 and the real property brings an annual rental of \$550. The legal heirs are Abbie Denyer, the widow, and seven daughters and one son.

Administrator of Thorne Estate—
C. L. McNary has been appointed by Judge Scott as administrator of the estate of the late William Thorne. The appointment was made upon the petition of Lillian McNary, who is the principal creditor of the deceased. The estate is valued at \$400, and there is no heir mentioned in the petition, and there is no will. W. E. Keyes, D. R. Yantis and W. H. Burghardt are appointed as appraisers.
