Great activity continues to be manifested at the board of trade rooms. New displays are constantly being added, and scores of new people are visiting the exhibit. These new comers seem to be delighted with the exhibit of Oregon fruits and the practical farmers among them manifest great interest in the grain and vegetable exhibits.

The latest exhibits are some well matured and ripened strawberries from the Hogg place, across the river, also some magnificent carrots from F. G. McLench, Route No. 1, Salem. One of the leading exhibits just brought in is several plates of Virginia Greening apples, gathered by McLench off his trees yesterday. They are sound and very attractive. But few of the new-comers can realize that they are just out of the orchard.
