Arrested for Being Obnoxious—

Mrs. Cora Witcheb, of Portland, daughter of Mr. Griswold, arrived in the city yesterday, and will remain here during her father's illness.

David J. Brewer.

David J. Brewer, for 17 years disciplinarian of the Salem Indian Training School, at Chemawa, died at St. Joseph's hospital, Tacoma, this morning, after a short illness. He was 42 years old, and has always taken a deep interest in the athletic work of the Indian schools. He was one of the first students when the school was established at Forest Grove in 1889, coming there as one of 24 Puyallup children. With the exception of two years he was in the Indian service constantly, and universally beloved. He leaves a family and his remains will be buried at Tacoma, where he had a residence on a tract of land near the city. Captain Brewer has held an important position in the educational work among Indians, and was highly respected by the students under him. Through all the vicissitudes of changing administrations he has been the one man relied upon at all times to exert a beneficial influence among the boys and girls, whether old students or young ones just fresh off the reservation. He could speak nearly all of the native Indian dialects, and was one of the most highly educated Indians in the government employ.

PLANNING FOR BETTER STREETS

Combining the Work on Bridges With Streets—Better Work for the Outside Wards.

Chairman Stoiz, of the committee on streets, has held that office but a few days, but has already shown an interest in better work in that department, which will bear fruit for the whole city. He has called a conference for Thursday evening between the street and bridge committees, to adopt a plan of uniform procedure and co-operation. The two committees will proceed hand in hand and map out a line of work that will bring about more satisfactory results.

Chairman Stoiz has willing supporters in Messrs Moores and Elliott, the other two business members of the committee. The bridge committee is also composed of business men—Eldridge, chairman, and Fraser and Rateliff. One determination has already been acted upon, that the main arteries of travel into the city—as the fair grounds road, Asylum avenue, State street and Southern traffic streets, shall be made passable first of all, so that traffic can get in and out of the city. This repair work is being done with a team and a cart and three men, and the worst holes are being filled with gravel. This will not take much work, but will obviate anyone breaking their neck trying to come to town to trade. Chairman Stoiz is also determined that justice shall be done the outside wards, which have in the past received very little for the taxes paid in the way of street attention.
