Passing of Dr. Rowland.

Dr. L. L. Rowland, one of Oregon's most respected and cultured citizens, passed to the great beyond Sunday at 4:30 a. m. at the Salem hospital, after a lingering illness.

Dr. Rowland was among the early pioneers of Oregon and spent his early life in Polk county, where he received a common school education. After finishing the public school he went to Virginia, where he graduated from the Bethany college, and later was married. Mr. and Mrs. Rowland returned to Oregon in 1869, and Dr. Rowland took part in the organization of the Bethel college, at Bethel, Polk county, of which institution he was elected president.

Mr. Rowland was elected later superintendent of public instruction, and served with credit to himself and the state. He then entered the medical department of Willamette University, where he graduated with honors, and left for Europe, where he spent a year in the various hospitals in study. Upon his return he was elected superintendent of the Oregon state insane asylum, under the Penoyer, McBride and Mettschan regiments. After serving in this capacity for four years, Dr. Rowland retired to his country home on the Abiqua, where he has since made his home.

He has been troubled with asthma the greater part of his life, and, owing to his age and his active life, there was a general break down.

A VICTIM OF HAZING

Chicago, Jan. 20.—A victim of hazing, Raymond Taylor, 16 years of age, and a pupil of the Eugene Folds school, is dead. Spinal meningitis was the immediate cause of death.

Taylor was hazed by two of his schoolmates ten days ago, attending school until last Tuesday. The young man was seized by the head and feet and bumped on the brick paving of the school yard. It was not thought that Taylor had sustained any injuries until Tuesday, when symptoms of spinal meningitis developed.
