San Francisco, Jan. 20.—The cruiser California steamed into port yesterday at the end of her final trial cruise. The California has more than come up to her contract stipulations, and in every way has earned her title of "The Pride of the Pacific Squadron."  
She cut the waves as far up the coast as Cape Blanco, Oregon, then played around and flew back to her home port full of honors.  
The contract called for a speed of 22 knots per hour for a continued four-hour run, under forced draught, and she had this average and a good fraction over.  
Each of the 18 guns of her main battery had been fired three times, and the guns, mounts and batteries had proven perfect.  
The California is the first cruiser of her class to make good on her trial trip.
