#### MYSTERIOUS MURDER.

San Rafael Girl Found With Skull Crushed.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Jan. 21.—Bessie Bottini, aged 18 years, of San Rafael, was found dead, with her skull crushed, near Miller station, three miles from San Rafael, last evening. It is not known how the young woman came by her death.

Misa Bottini, who is employed in the Carson glove factory, at San Rafael, took the 4:30 afternoon train, intending to visit her brother. Her body was found a mile further up the road. It was thought at first that having been carried beyond her destination, the young woman had jumped from the moving car, but the sheriff's officers think this unlikely, as there were no marks on the wet earth.
