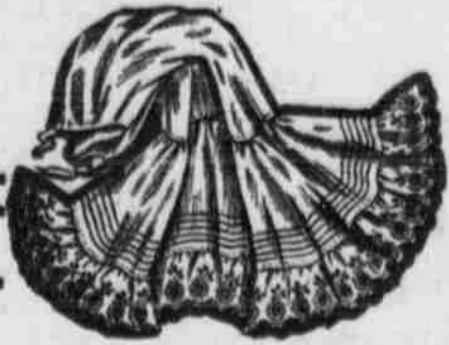

CITY COUNCIL DOES GOOD BUSINESS

More Than Two Miles Of Streets to Be Improved In the Near Future

The council met in regular session last night, and held a harmonious session, transacting a large amount of business.

Among the most important business taken up was the acceptance of Carnegie's library gift, referring of a resolution asking for the removal of the "Y" at the corner of State and High streets, the favoring of the improvement of 45 blocks of the city's streets and the introduction of a new dog ordinance.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Rodgers, and the following aldermen answered to the roll call: Elliott, Radcliff, Goode, Jacobs, Fraser, Low, Stolz, Eldridge, Millard, Moffitt and Moores.

The list of standing committees was announced by the mayor.

The mayor announced that Alderman Jacobs should serve until his successor, Alderman-elect Presnell should be duly qualified.

Opinion of City Attorney Keyes read, to the effect that the city is not responsible for injuring by shooting of Frank X. Dick, a German subject, by Policeman Busiek. Report adopted. Mayor Rodgers suggested that city is under moral obligation to the victim of the policeman's gun and that it would be only fair to make some small appropriation to help pay Dick's hospital expense. A committee, consisting of Low, Stolz and Elliott was appointed to take care of the Dick matter.

City Attorney Keyes rendered an opinion that the city has until April 13 to advertise for bids for the improvement of Pine street.

The owners of the old mill race in the northern part of the city will be required to appear before the council on February 17 and explain why the nuisance has not been abated, it being declared a menace to health.

Detailed specifications for building the various macadam streets were read, and referred to the ordinance committee.

An amendment was offered to section 5, ordinance No. 442, increasing the liquor license from \$400 to \$600 to be paid semi-annually in advance. This was referred to the ordinance committee, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

COUNCIL—Two 16-candle power lights were ordered placed at the corners of B and Second streets and Lafayette and High streets.

New Business. Alderman Stolz stated that the time for buying a sweeper for the city was opportune and moved that the street committee be appointed to ascertain the price of a two-horse sweeper with an extra spindle and report at next meeting. The motion was adopted.

Bridge Committee Harmonious. The aldermen stated that the committee on bridges had held a meeting during the week and was working in perfect harmony.

The council authorized the committees on street and bridges to purchase lumber for the use of the city for 1908.

Alderman Stolz said that the committee on streets and bridges should be authorized to make such repairs in the streets as becomes necessary from time to time. "Of times," said the alderman, "the bridges are broken and endanger traffic and if the committee had power to make the proper repairs it would be a great saving and also a protection."

The bridge committee was given power to make all necessary repairs to the bridges.

Officers Must Use Form. It was ordered that the printing committee frame a requisition to be used by all city officers in ordering supplies.

A Dumping Ground. It was ordered that the health committee investigate the various parts of the city to find a suitable place for a dumping ground and report at the next meeting.

It was the consensus of opinion that a public dumping ground was essential to the cleanliness of the city. It was brought out in the discussion that nearly all the creeks in the city had been filled with rubbish and cans and various articles could be found in the sand bars in the river which not only built up bars to hinder navigation but was very unhealthy.

Near one unsanitary place in North Salem there were reported three cases of fever which were supposed to have been caused by decaying rubbish in the dumping place near by.

The "Y." A lengthy resolution was introduced for the purpose of compelling the Oregon Electric to remove the "Y" which had been placed at the corner of State and High streets.

The matter was referred to the street committee with power to act. Alderman Jacobs said that he was not quite ready to vote on the question and did not think that it would be right to put the car company off of State street until the council was better informed.

Mayor Rodgers said that the right of way called for "all switches and proper connections with the Portland General Electric." He thought that the Oregon Electric would claim that it only built that portion of the "Y" on High street while the Portland General would claim the improvements on State.

The suggestion in the petition that the "Y" be placed on Ferry and High was opposed by Alderman Low, who thought that Ferry street would not afford sufficient room. The question as to the car company's rights and what constitutes "proper connections and switches" will be placed before the city attorney this week.

Library Fund Accepted. A resolution was adopted authorizing the acceptance of the Carnegie gift of \$14,000 for a city library and that the city appropriate 10 per cent of the amount each year for its maintenance. A letter was received from Carnegie's secretary stating that he considered \$14,000 a sufficient sum to build a library commensurate with the city's needs.

Company Must Get Off Bridge. A resolution was adopted authorizing the city attorney to notify the Portland General Electric to vacate the concrete bridge over North Mill creek immediately.

It is understood that the company has made arrangements to build a bridge just east of the concrete structure and that the work will be begun at an early date.

Other Business. The committee on sewerage was authorized to investigate the sewerage and drainage in South Salem, south of Mission street and report at next meeting.

A resolution was adopted requiring the Oregon Electric to comply with the city grades and crossing ordinances in North Salem.

A petition asking for a light to be placed at the corner of North Fourteenth and Nebraska avenue was referred to the committee on lights.

The committee on health and police was allowed \$2 for postage and stationery.

"Dad's" Petition. A petition signed by about 75 business men of the city asking the city fathers not to drive "Dad" Gier off the streets with his peanut wagon was referred to the street committee.

Specifications Referred. The specifications for the improvement of various streets in North Salem was referred to the street committee.

Alderman Jacobs said that the people of his part of the town were in the mud waist deep and while he

J. M. Lawrence was chosen to succeed himself in the office of a member of the park board which position became vacant on January 20 by the expiration of his term.

It was ordered that the election of a city surveyor be made a special order for next meeting.

More Policemen.

The council ordered that the chief of police be authorized to appoint assistant officers in cases of emergencies, who will act without pay; also that the chief of the fire department be an officer at all times. The health officer and street commissioner were also given authority to wear the star.

A resolution which was read to repeal section 5, relating to the obstruction of streets was referred to the ordinance committee.

Dog Ordinance.

A five-page ordinance relating to the duties and appointment of a poundmaster and for the fixing of a dog license and the collection of the same was read for the first and second times and referred to the committee on ordinances.

The city attorney was requested to investigate the dog case which is pending before the supreme court and report at next meeting.

PRISON CHAPEL SCHOOLROOM

The Oregon state prison authorities have agreed on a plan for the construction of a model prison chapel, assembly and school room. The new structure will be added to the east wing, and is planned to accommodate 800 persons, with recreation rooms. The plan is to make the brick and erect the building with prison labor, with a small appropriation from the next legislature. It has the approval of the Prisoners' Aid Society, and is believed to be a move in the direction of reform and humanity.
