### JAIL MAKES HIM NERVOUS

San Francisco, Jan. 23.—William J. Barnett, disgraced official of the defunct California Safe, Deposit & Trust Company, through City Physician James T. Watkins, has made application to Sheriff Dolan to be allowed to sleep on a cot in the main corridor, alleging that the continuous sight of the bars in front of him, is rapidly unnering his whole system. Dr. Watkins has recommended that the sheriff take action immediately, and further states that Barnett is so far gone that he paces up and down in the main corridor during his hours of exercise, running his fingers through his hair, clearly indicating his nervous condition.  
Commenting on the situation this morning in the county jail Sheriff Dolan agreed with Dr. Watkins that the jail is not sufficiently well heated and that during the night all the prisoners are exposed to draughts, and very few of them have escaped contracting colds.

#### The Car and the Douma.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 23.—Trouble is brewing between the cabinet and the Czar over the latter's plan for a new Russian army. In fact, it is being whispered in well-informed circles that matters have reached a stage where the Czar is about to call the cabinet to account.  
It is said that the ministers were themselves responsible for the unexpected opposition that developed in the Douma against the Czar's plan. The latter's unofficial advisers are pointing the finger of suspicion at the ministers.  
Committee to Visit Coast.

Washington, Jan. 23.—Representative Smith has been informed that probably the entire house committee on naval affairs will visit the Pacific coast early next summer, and that they will include the site of the proposed navy yard at San Diego on their route. Because of the incitation of congress toward economy this year it may not be possible to secure an appropriation for the San Diego project, but Smith expects to have little trouble in securing at least an authorization for an investigation of a site south of San Francisco, which will mean San Francisco.

## WILL ALTER MURPHY BUILDING

One of Salem's Oldest Bricks to Be Remodeled and Transformed Into a Modern Office Building.

That Salem is not affected by the recent financial panic is demonstrated by the building activity which is being shown in the city at present. The residence section is alive with home-seekers and those who either have dwellings in the course of construction or are planning to build in the near future. The recent paving of Court street has been followed by numerous improvements along that spacious thoroughfare until it has become one of the most attractive streets in the city. There is a report current that the second and third floors of the Murphy building on the corner of State and Commercial streets, one of the oldest landmarks of the city, will soon be remodeled and made into offices fitted with every modern convenience. It has been impossible to see the proprietor of the building, but it is said that the entire structure will be remodeled, which will, with the other improvements proposed, put the old brick on a par with the best buildings in the city.

The structure was finished in the fall of 1862 as a one-story building and was occupied by Wells, Fargo & Co. During the following spring William Griswold, the owner of the property, decided to add the other two stories, which was done during the year 1863. At that time there were only two other brick buildings in the city, namely, the Moores block, on the corner of Commercial and State, and the brick now occupied by the Lawrence grocery store, on the corner of Commercial and Ferry streets.

In the construction of the building the mills here could not furnish much of the lumber needed, and the rafters, sills and woodwork used was rafted down from Eola. It was at this time that the phrase, "If you can't get it here send to Eola after it," originated.

In those times greenbacks were used in paying for the labor.

Street Commissioner J. M. Martin, who was a school teacher and clerk, was the one to whom Mr. Griswold relied to keep tab from time to time on the value of the paper maxima. Mr. Martin, in explaining his method of obtaining the value of the currency to a Journal reporter last evening, said: "We always took for a basis the staple number 10000 and into this we divided the current quotation of the premium on gold. Thus if gold was quoted in New York at a premium of 20, a dollar greenback would be worth 80 cents. The value of paper money in those days was from 60 to 65 cents."

The building when completed was occupied for about ten years by Bolla & Brown as a general merchandise store. The property was bought from Mr. Griswold by Judge Murphy, in whose name and that of his heirs it has since remained. The structure is about 80x50 and runs to the alley between Front and Commercial streets.
