**TRAMPS MAKE CHICAGO SIT UP**

Chicago, Jan. 24.—The police department is actually alarmed at the demonstration made yesterday by the followers of Ben Reitman, "King of Tramps," in defying the police, who were forced to use their batons to break up the line of march. As evidence of this fear, Chief of Police Shippy has ordered extra rounds of cartridges to be taken from the department's arsenals, and the fire departments have been instructed to hold itself in readiness to aid, with streams of water, in dispersing any mob of demonstrators that may gather.

The city authorities were not awake to the seriousness of the situation until the people under Reitman's command showed actual fight when the police charged them. It was a revelation to them. They had never dreamed that the police could be trifled in the slightest manner.

"King" Reitman was still in a defiant mood this morning. He declined to waive a trial by jury, and demanded an immediate hearing. His case was set for trial before Justice Sadler, in the municipal court, to which he was escorted by the police.

By order of Chief Shippy, reserves in all the 42 police stations throughout the city have been strengthened in anticipation of trouble.

**HORST VERSUS DURST**

**FAMOUS OPERATOR HAS APPEARED IN THE GREAT DRAMA OF THE HOP GROWERS' STRUGGLE WITH THE DEATH OF THE HOP GROWING INDUSTRY.**

Paul R. G. Horst, the millionaire hop operator, who has been in the city for a few days, has been got into the newspapers in the great game that is being played here in which the growers, the dealers and the grower-dealers are star performers. The Capital Journal is not the organ of any faction, and hence was slow to publish Mr. Horst's version of the situation. The great big dose of Durst is now succeeded by a brew of the latest importation—called Horst. Mr. Horst is the man who boomed hops to 35 cents in 1906, and parted with a cool half million of the coin of the realm to the growers.

Today he is saying there are hops enough to do the country a year, and another great big crop will finally put the whole industry on the hobo list.

Mr. Horst is a man worth paying some attention to. He has been known as the champion market booster of the country, and his firm, with immense connections, has handled 50,000 bales of the 300,000 bales raised on the Pacific coast. If he is a bull Mr. Horst is not trying to raise any false hopes in the breasts of the growers. He does not discourage the growers going into the union. He is one of the best-informed, all-around walking encyclopedias on hop statistics on earth today, and those who are managing the union might do worse than get some information from Mr. Horst. Primarily Mr. Horst is here in consultation with his counsel, Ford & Kaiser, over the litigation started by Louis Lachmund & Co., over unfulfilled contracts.

**COLLEGE EDITOR IS BOUNCED**

Stanford University, Cal., Jan. 24.—"For inciting and participating in a disorder in a public hall in Palo Alto." Edward A. Cunha, managing editor of the "Daily Palo Alto," has been suspended from the institution for the remainder of the academic year. This action of the faculty is the most drastic since the suspension of B. S. Allen, a former editor of the Daily Palo Alto, and its cause was the disturbance precipitated last week when E. P. E. Troy, an attorney of San Francisco, demanded an investigation of the affairs of the town officials, and the students responding to an invitation issued by the officials became involved in a riot.

Cunha took part in the affair first when he posted in Eucina Hall a notice purporting to come from Mayor Parkinson, in which the students were asked to attend the meeting, and secondly because of the prominent part he afterwards played in the riot in the vestibule of the hall. He was clubbed at this time by one of the town officials.

**NEW LIGHTING CONTRACT FOR STATE.**

Rollin K. Page today closed a new contract for lighting all the state institutions for the period of ten years. The attorney-general and state buildings board met with State Superintendent of Asylum Steiner and State Prison Superintendent James, and went over the matter, securing a material reduction.
