HARRIMAN AND GOULD EMBRACE

Southern and Western Pacific Settle All Their Differences and Become Friends.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Jan. 25.—E. H. Harriman and George Gould have at last got together, have smoked the pipe of peace, and have buried the hatchet. The hatchet in this particular warfare means the rival interests of Harriman's Southern Pacific and Gould's Western Pacific railroad in California. The peace agreement, which was ratified by Messrs. Gould and Harriman this week in New York, is an all-embracing treaty, and is sweeping. Its main points are: The two rival railroads will cease fighting each other. The pending lawsuits over the Oakland water front and the Western Pacific's right of way, which have been so bitterly contested during the last three years, up to the United States supreme court, are to be amicably compromised out of court, dismissed, or allowed to lag until they die a natural death.

Mutually agreeable traffic rates are to be established, and the traffic managers of both roads agree to live up to the rates outlined.

There will be no cutting of rates and no embarrassing competition, although the semblance of opposition is to be maintained on both sides, just enough to keep beyond the clutches of the interstate law and the federal statutes against pooling.

Politically, too, the two rival roads are to cease fighting each other. Thus it was agreed at the last meeting of the "higher ups" this week to keep the agreement quiet, if possible, until after the presidential election.

GENEROUS PIONEER BURIED

The body of the late John Savage was placed in its final resting place shortly after noon today, in Rural cemetery.

The impressive funeral services were conducted from the home near the fair grounds at 11 o'clock this morning by Rev. P. S. Knight.

Mr. Knight stated that he had known Mr. Savage for over 45 years, and delivered a splendid eulogy of the old pioneer.

A quartet, composed of Miss Myrtle Knowland, Mrs. Charles Knowland, L. F. Savage and Robert Galax, sang "Abide With Me" and "Nearer My God to Thee."

Over 100 loving friends and relatives of the deceased attended the services.

The casket was elaborately trimmed with silver, and was almost hid with flowers. Large clusters of lilies and carnations, intermingled with smilax, were the silent witnesses of the regard in which this departed pioneer was held.

Frank Herren, Horace Herren, Silr Fletcher, Joe Worth, Frank Worth and Fred Minzenmeier bore the pall.

NORMAL SCHOOLS EARN FEES

Secretary Starr last evening completed reports for the fourth month of the State Normal Schools, under the centralized board of regents, which shows the following facts of interest to the public:

Ashland—Total enrollment to January 1, 140; average number of students belonging, 132; average daily attendance, 122; fees collected, \$776.50; balance on hand, January 1, \$25,488.

Drain—Total enrollment to date, 78; average number of students belonging, 70; average daily attendance, 69; fees collected, \$432; balance on hand, January 1, \$1500.

Monmouth—Total enrollment to date, 136; average number students belonging, 123; average daily attendance, 116; balance on hand January 1, \$3000; total fees \$2027.50.

Weston—Enrollment to date, 182; average number of students belonging, 176; average daily attendance, 170; total tuition fees collected, \$1159.44; balance on hand, \$19,500.

BIG CATTLE MAN REMOVES HIS FENCES.

San Francisco, Jan. 25.—The case against Thomas B. Armstrong, a wealthy cattle man of Shasta county, who was indicted by the federal grand jury in October, 1906, for unlawfully fencing government land, was dismissed this morning by Judge Delavan, because Armstrong had removed his fences.
