COLEMAN HAS NOT RESIGNED

Vanderbilt Girl Marries An Unpronouncable Count

JAPANESE SPIES WORKING FRISCO

May Have Been Only Hoboes Trying to Get a Night's Free Lodging

San Francisco, Jan. 27.—Bullets fired with deadly intent by National guard sharpshooters yesterday morning frustrated a second attempt to capture the army of Companies K and L, Fifth Infantry of the National guard. In the building, which is located at Buchanan and Waller streets, are kept valuable military maps of San Francisco's coast defenses and topographical plans of the peninsula.

The attack on the building was not a burglar's ordinary operation, seems apparent from the persistence of the mysterious visitors. They Saturday morning and again in the darkness of Sunday morning two men tried to gain an entrance into the premises. Fearing that a third attempt might be made, Captain J. C. Mund ordered the guard of soldiers doubled last night. Armed men watched the premises from nightfall Sunday until dawn this morning.

One of the marauders was nearly killed Saturday morning, a bullet from the revolver of Sergeant Hamm piercing his hat. From the description of the trespassers furnished the officers of the regiment by the sentries the authorities are working on the theory that Japanese spies were seeking to gain entrance to the secrets of the army.

SECY. TAFT REPORTS PROGRESS

IN THE PHILIPPINES

FOUR THOUSAND SCHOOLHOUSES THE REGULAR ARMY AND ALLOWING THE NATIVES TO HOLD OFFICE IS DOING THE WORK OF CIVILIZATION.

Washington, Jan. 27.—The report of Secretary Wm. H. Taft on his recent tour to the Philippines has been laid before the President. Taft called from Seattle in September and landed at Manila in time to be present at the opening of the Filipino congress, which, in co-operation with the American Philippine commission, is the governing body of the island. Taft reviews all that has been done to bring peace and prosperity to the islands since Dewey sailed into the harbor and drove out the Spaniards, with the help of Aguinaldo. He recites how there was an insurrection, and how for years guerilla warfare had to be stamped out, the ladrone system and the armed banditti crushed. He says the regular army did grand work. At present there are nearly 4000 public schools in the islands, all the way from little log school houses for the children of farm laborers to the agricultural college and industrial schools. The people have but one desire in education, and that is to learn English and American ideas of business and government.

Taft made the return trip by way of the Trans-Siberian railroad and landed in New York, having been nearly a month in the islands, and only 72 days on the road. He proved that a man can go round the world by the short North American and Siberian route in less than 80 days. The report proves that from the first day of occupation by the Americans to the present there has been a continuous policy of fitting the natives as rapidly as possible for the duty of self-government, and as fast as ready for the task allowing them to share in the actual work of governing their own country. Taft raps the anti-imperialists hard, as well as those who believe the islands should be turned over to the people there, which, he contends, would result in bloody chaos and the acquisition by the islands at an early day by some other national sovereignty. Both of these theories he holds to be untenable and unpatriotic.

GLADYS VANDERBILT MARRIES A NOBLEMAN.

New York, Jan. 27.—At high noon today Gladys Vanderbilt became the wife of Count Laxlo Szechenyi, the Hungarian nobleman. The ceremony was carried out with simple elegance, there being absent the usual confusion that has been so noticeable at fashionable weddings.

Cornelius Vanderbilt, brother of the bride, gave her away. This fact is taken as an indication that there has been a complete reconciliation in the Vanderbilt family. The wedding is said to be the culmination of a love match pure and simple, by those who know the bride and groom. The ceremony was performed by Mgs. LaVelle. The Pope sent apostolic benediction through Archbishop Farley.

THAW'S MENTAL CONDITION

FROM CHILDHOOD

HYPOTHETICAL QUESTION WILL AGAIN BE SUBMITTED TO THE EXPERTS IN BRAIN DISTURBANCES THAT OCCUR WHEN MEN COMMIT CRIMES.

New York, Jan. 27.—When the trial of Harry Thaw was resumed this morning Dr. Charles Francis Bingham, of Pittsburg, who was physician for the Thaw family for many years, was the first witness called to the stand.

The purpose of his testimony was to show Thaw's mental condition at various stages of his life, from the time he was a baby up to the present time. He testified that Harry was nervous when he was a child, and appeared irrational when he saw him in the Tombs.

Dr. Sidney Ruddlel Wells, of London, who treated Thaw in 1899, was the next witness. He says he was called to Claridge's hotel to examine Thaw and that the latter was suffering from a mental disturbance of some kind.

At 10:35 o'clock the defense had all its direct evidence in hand, and Attorney Littleton began the reading of the hypothetical question to the three experts for the defense.

THE COLEMAN RESIGNATION

True Condition of the Status of a Much-Mooted Controversy.

There are so many rumors afloat as to what has really taken place in the matter of the resignation of President Coleman that a true account is here given the public, to put at rest all talk in that gentleman's absence in the East to visit his mother and attend the Baltimore convocation of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church. In November Dr. Coleman tendered his resignation as president of Willamette University to the board of trustees. The board met in December and declined to accept the resignation, although the chairman of the board and two others favored such a course. January 7 the trustees met in Salem, and it was decided that all action taken at the December session of the board of trustees was irregular, and hence illegal, and that left the resignation still pending with no action taken. The fight against Coleman was put up by three or four people, and has never been supported at Salem, where his work is best known and appreciated. There is still a faction that says Coleman must go, but there can be no action taken until the end of this school year.

JEWELRY ROBBERS HAVE BEEN CAPTURED.

Marysville, Cal., Jan. 27.—Harry Rogers and James Reed, who are thought by the police to have been implicated in the recent jewelry store robberies in Sacramento and Stockton, have been captured here.

In their possession were found sets of burglar tools, four unset diamonds, three topaz, one apal and several gold rings.

CHAUFFEUR LOVED HUNGARIAN PRINCESS

Tried to Dash Over a High Precipice With the Family Automobile

Bucharest, Roumania, Jan. 27.—The Princess Chika, who was seriously injured recently in the wreck of her husband's automobile during a fight between the prince and his mad chauffeur, to prevent the latter from steering the machine over a 100-foot cliff, is pronounced out of danger.

The chauffeur, an Italian, was in love with the princess, and had troubled her so much with his attentions that she threatened to tell her husband. It was evidently in revenge that the man sought to kill himself and employers by a dash over a precipice up the face of which the river road runs outside of Bucharest.

Though the prince, suspecting the plan, wrenched the steering wheel from the lunatic's hands in time to prevent the plunge, the automobile was tumbled bottom upward in the road, killing the chauffeur and seriously injuring the princess. The prince was unhurt.

The circular charged Baker City with being a "stink pot of corruption." Among the specific charges are these:
