Initiative petitions were filed today for what is known as the upper river fisheries bill, to regulate gillnet fishing. It had over 13,000 signatures.

Arrested for Larceny—
George Holt and E. H. Inger were on Saturday arrested by Chief Gibson, upon a warrant sworn out by Xavier Fayas, charging the larceny of a razor and a clothes brush. Vann, manager of the Bijou Stock Company, serious loss was averted. He burned his fingers tearing out live wires. The place was badly smoked up.

The Capital Business College basketball team Saturday night defeated the Woodburn high school in a hard-fought contest with a score of 32 to 18. Cole, the efficient C. B. C. center, was the star of the local team, scoring eight goals from the field, and is reported to have "been in the game" at every moment. Bonney, Woodburn's forward, was the point maker for the "Queen City" aggregation.
