TO BE HONEST FOR HONESTY'S SAKE.

We have the local story of the young man who went to the bank for \$500, and who received by mistake a package of clearing-house certificates; who believed that, so long as the extra \$500 came into his possession without his actual reaching behind the paying teller's window and stealing it he was legally privileged to spend it; and that, incidentally it was not unwise to let his friends know something of his good fortune and HOW THOROUGHLY UP TO THE DATE HE WAS IN HIS CODE OF ETHICS.

Now it appears that that same young man is in trouble.

Where he failed the law would take no cognizance of his failure to return the \$500 which belonged to the bank, crime is charged, and WHAT YESTERDAY SEEMED TO BE A JOKE IS TODAY A VERY GRAVE AFFAIR.

This young man is, perhaps, no better nor any worse than scores, and maybe hundreds, of other young men—or old men, for that matter—whose honesty rests upon whatever virtue there may be in the old saw that possession is nine points of the law.

The noteworthy feature of the episode is that it accords with A CERTAIN, SO-CALLED RESPECTABLE TEACHING.

All too commonly has it been held that to be legally honest is sufficient; that to profit by the other fellow's mistake and blunders is evidence of commendable shrewdness.

Upon this sort of philosophy is based every scheme of exploitation which good conscience denounces, but which finds defense in the courts IN EVERY TECHNICAL QUibble WHICH THE LAW PERMITS, OR WHICH THE EXPERT LEGAL MIND CAN DISCOVER.

With this class, in other words, to be legally honest is to be sufficiently honest.

Happily there is not such adherence to this standard of ethics as there was at one time—by which we do not mean to say, exactly, that at any time any considerable number of the rank and file of men would have been guilty OF SO FOOLISH AN ACT AS THIS YOUNG MAN.

But the fact which interests us is the more general rejection of this brand of honesty that is stretched to the limitations of the law.

Notwithstanding the evidence of much chicanery in the conduct of public and private affairs, of questionable practice based upon mercenary interest, there is ground for the optimistic belief that SUCH DISCLOSURE HERE SPEAKS THE AWAKENING OF PUBLIC CONSCIENCE.

It does not mean that conditions are worse, but better than they were; that we are drifting about in the true anchorage; that we are no longer honest because it was written in the copybook that "honesty is the best policy," but because of the well-settled public conviction that to be honest for honesty's sake is the proper doctrine.
