

BOOSTERS CLUB BUSY

Up Street Improvements, the Horse Show, Board of Trade Banquet and Stayton-Mehama Electric Road.

The Salem Boosters' club met in the board of trade rooms last night and held a short but important business meeting.

The various committees are working in harmony and will doubtless accomplish much for the betterment of the city and vicinity.

For Street Improvement. A resolution was passed endorsing Mayor Rodgers' recommendation that the various streets of the city should be improved.

The question of paving Twelfth street from State to the depot was discussed and President McNary being authorized to appoint a committee to confer with the committee of the board of trade and the property owners, stated that they would defer the appointment until they could meet with the committee representing the board of trade.

Several members spoke enthusiastically on the subject of the proposed improvement and thought that the improvement could be made so as to materially reduce the cost to the property owners. It was suggested that the sidewalk along the university ground on Twelfth street should be made to conform with the line of the walk on the east side of the canyon which would narrow the street to be paved.

Mayor Rodgers said that it was probable that the railroad company would grade and pave the track along Twelfth street, which would tend to lighten the expense.

A Horse Show. Plans will be taken to hold a horse show in Salem some time in April. To have the various breeders exhibit horses in the city for suitable prizes would not only promote interest for better stock but it would bring thousands of people into the city on that date, which would be a financial success to all lines of business.

Board of Trade Banquet. Probably the most important matter discussed was the big banquet which will be given in Salem to the board of trade about the middle of April. It is proposed to have an excursion from Portland to Salem for the accommodation of the board of trade business men. An elaborate banquet will be served in this city at which time development topics will be discussed. One of the most important matters to be taken up is the building of various electric lines in Salem to the neighboring cities.

The Boosters will co-operate with the board of trade in entertaining the visitors and bringing to a successful termination the projects for the up-building of the community.

Check Should Be Lighted. A resolution was adopted for the appointment of a committee to call on the county court and request that a glass dial be placed in the court house clock and properly lighted so that lamp posts similar to those on the postoffice grounds be installed at the four corners of the court house grounds.

The committee was appointed and consists of the following enthusiastic members: Charles McNary, Mayor Rodgers and U. G. Boyer.

Change Meeting Night. A vote of the club it was decided to meet on the second Monday evening of each month. This reduces the number of meetings from one each month. Special meetings may be called at any time.
