hour case, to the refusal of the district attorney to definitely set the case, and to a statement appearing in the newspapers in regard to his client.

"I see," he added, "that you intend to take the deposition of Thos. Burns. Well, I would like to see you do it. He is under subpoena in this case, and cannot leave the state, whether he desires to or not. His desires have nothing to do with the matter. He cannot give a deposition. There are other ways of keeping witnesses in the state."

"Well, we will settle that matter Saturday," interposed Langdon.

"Yes, and there will be other things settled at that time, too," replied Moore, significantly. "A day or so ago my son was standing here in court and spoke a few words with Abraham Ruef in regard to some continuances. It was stated in one of the organs of the prosecution that we had attempted to buy Ruef, and that we had no right to speak to him. I gave notice right now that as long as Ruef is in the county jail, where there are no peek holes or earholes, that I shall visit him whenever I think it is necessary. He is a co-defendant, and will presumably be a witness in the coming trial. I shall talk to him whenever I—"

"I don't suppose there will be anything new in these defendants conferring with Ruef," interrupted Langdon. "They have done it before, and will do it again, I presume."

"That's not so," Langdon, and you know it," shouted Ruef, his face white with anger.

"We know it is so," immediately replied Langdon.

"You know no such thing," declared Ruef, arising from his seat. Upon Judge Lawlor leaving the bench the argument was stopped, and the two belligerents went their different ways.

Before leaving the court room Ruef made the following statement:

"The statement made by the district attorney that I had been in communication with other defendants in the United Railroads cases, which I denounced in open court as being absolutely false, I now reaffirm."

"It would have been impossible for me to do so, had I so desired. Every breath I drew, every step I took, every move I made was watched by five guards, presumably in the employ of Elisor Biggy, but in reality by Burns."

"The statement was based upon the story to the effect that Attorney Earl Rogers had congratulated me at the conclusion of the case of the prosecution against Tiery L. Ford, which is absolutely false and is known to be so by the district attorney. Rogers came to me when Heney announced that his case was closed, and asked if he could ask one or two questions. The deputy clerks, who were sitting upon each side of me, replied that he could not speak to me at all without an order from Biggy. That was the entire conversation and Rogers immediately left me. The matter was reported to both Burns and Biggy, not only by the two deputy clerks, but by myself.

"The story of an attempted escape on my part, which has been sent out to influence public sentiment, is absolutely false."

HOUSE SLAPS ROOSEVELT

Washington, Jan. 30.—As an indication that the house of representatives does not approve of the course taken by President Roosevelt in his controversy with Rear-Admiral Brownson, that august body today, through its committee on appropriations, declined to set aside one cent for the maintenance of the hospital ship Relief.

The house could not have placed its stamp of disapproval on the President's plans relative to the ship in a more effective manner. Hence the navy department has been forced to put two colliers out of business in order to secure sufficient money to carry out the anti-Brownson plans. These funds will be used to equip the hospital ship. Chairman Tawney, chairman of the appropriations committee, in explaining to the house the action the committee had taken, seemed to be quite proud of it. Not a single member of the house raised a word in protest.

JAPS ARE LEAVING SAN FRANCISCO

Jap Consul Says Firms Are Selling Out On Account of Lack of Patronage and Are Going Home

San Francisco, Jan. 30.—Whether pursuant to orders from Japan or on the advice of the local Japanese consul, the merchants and laboring class of Japanese are leaving this city and betaking themselves to their island homes. For the last month a concerted movement has been going on among the Japanese, particularly of the merchant class, toward pack-

ing up their effects or selling them off and leaving San Francisco.

In the last week at least 10 Japanese firms have closed their doors. A systematic effort is being made by the Japanese to quietly dispose of their business holdings and depart.

The Japanese consul politely declines to discuss the matter, but admits that the firms are selling out owing to "poor business."

WANTS TO SELL SILETZ SANDS

Washington, Jan. 30.—Senator Bourne today introduced a bill authorizing the sale of lands belonging to Siletz Indians in Oregon, under conditions to be prescribed by the secretary of the interior.

SAILS FROM BUENOS AYRES

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 30.—The American torpedo flotilla sailed from this port this morning on its way to San Francisco. The next port touched by the flotilla will be Punta Arenas.

WOMAN DIES FROM WOUNDS

Fruitvale, Cal., Jan. 30.—Mrs. Theodore Kosch, the pretty wife of a Fruitvale restaurant keeper, who was shot by Alois Machala, an iron worker, died at the Alameda sanatorium. Machala had been rooming at the Kosch home. No trace of the murderer has been found.

MURDERED HIS WIFE

Stockton, Cal., Jan. 30.—Insanely jealous of his wife and driven desperate because she had left him, James A. Martin, of this city, went to where she was working in a country home five miles east of here this morning, shot her dead and blew his own brains out. He was 58 years of age and she 42. The couple had reared eight children. The two youngest children witnessed the double tragedy.

NOT GROUNDS FOR DIVORCE

Portland, Or., Jan. 30.—According to the decision of Judge Bronaugh yesterday in refusing to grant Eva Palmerton a divorce from Orrin Palmerton a man may be either an anarchist or a Socialist, and not be cruel to his wife, and the fact that a man is an anarchist or a Socialist does not constitute a cause for divorce. Further than this husbands in Oregon even may point their fingers at their wives, and the latter cannot find any law for the remedy.

HALL CASE WAS TAME

Portland, Or., Jan. 30.—The Hall case dragged along today without any feature. Hall is still on the stand, giving direct testimony explaining his version of his conduct while district attorney. Some time this afternoon Heney will probably begin the cross-examination.

"MISTAH" GANS MAY RE-ENTER THE RING

Announces in New York He Cannot Remain Idle as Long as There is Somebody to Fight.

Joe Gans dropped in yesterday afternoon. Joe looked like a Bermuda millionaire in his fur-lined coat and diamond-studded tie, writes Robert Edgren for the New York World. "I want to say," began Gans after sitting down, "that I'm back in the ring. I've changed my mind about giving up that championship. I thought for a while that I'd have to sit back and take it easy because there wasn't anyone for me to fight, but I see that McFarland is coming up and that Nelson has beaten somebody and wants to fight me again. So here I am."

"Are you tired of the rest?" was asked.

"Yes, sir," said Gans. "I thought I'd like it, but I find I like the game a little better. I'd rather fight than lay off, if there is only somebody for me to fight. Jeffries and I have the same trouble. Jeff can't get matches because he is so big and strong. I can't get anyone to fight me in my class because I have too much knowledge of the game. I'm the only one left of the old timers who is still in good fighting shape."

"There aren't any great fighters now-a-days. Why, when I was doing my hardest fighting the fighters outclassed the boys you see now. There aren't any McFaddens or Hawkins or Ernes or Walcotts or Fitzsimmons now. They've all gone by and there ain't any new ones in their class. But there ain't any reason for me to stop fighting as long as I can get anyone to fight. I'm still at my best. I never felt any age yet. I never feel any stiffness or any pains. My hands are good. And I know more than any of these new fellows. You can gamble when I feel age coming along I'm not going to stay in the ring and get beaten up like some of these fellows. I won't need to."

"I have earned \$81,000 in the past sixteen months and I haven't thrown it away. I've got a good hotel and the best cafe in Baltimore, and I own every bit of it. It's mine. No liquor company is behind me. I've put my money in property where it'll always make a living for me. I've only done one foolish thing. I thought I'd be swell and have an auto like the rest of the millionaires. It cost me \$52,000 and if I keep on

running into things I guess the repair bills will put me down and out. It's being repaired in the factory now.

Willing to Meet Nelson.

"I see Nelson wants to fight me. I'll take on Nelson or McFarland, weigh in at 133 pounds ringside, and split the purse 75 and 25. McFarland told me in Chicago he wouldn't think of fighting me for another year, as he wants more experience. I'd like to fight Nelson. I want to knock him out and settle all disputes. He gave me a hard fight at Goldfield. Nelson is an exception. He's a Joe Grim, only he knows more than Grim. He can't be knocked out with one punch. It's dead easy to hit him on the jaw. I hit him as hard as I knew how to at Goldfield, but even when I dropped him he got up strong. You can't reach his body, because he's always covered with his arms and elbows. He's so slow that he can't hit a clever boxer himself. I always had plenty of time to block or step aside when I saw his punches start. But he's a wonder at taking it. I beat him up as hard as I knew how for eleven rounds. Then I said to myself: 'This fellow can't be knocked out in a hurry. I guess I'll have to do something else or I'll whip myself hitting him.'

"You know wearing yourself out punching a fellow like Nelson is just as bad as getting a lot of punishment. When you're tired you might as well be weak from taking the beating. When you're tired you're all in anyway, even if you haven't been hit. So I began making Nelson do all of the work. I'd take a step and make him take three or four. He was always coming in. Then in the clinches I'd let him push me around while I rested. He has all sorts of dirty tricks. He fixed his hair up some way so it prickled and cut like wire. In every clinch he dropped his head against my neck and chest and rubbed his head around. My chest was raw and bleeding, and every time he used his head it hurt like being scraped with sandpaper. He was always fighting foul. Siler told me after the fight that Nelson fouled me at least 50 times, but that he saw I wasn't in danger, and he let it go, because he thought I'd rather win with a knockout than have it stopped.

"I'll fight Nelson again any time at 133 pounds ringside, 75 to the winner and 25 to the loser. I'm doing a theatrical stunt at Miner's soil to be work freely, not too wet, and the vines should not be crowded. Bowery next week, but I'd rather be out fighting again if they can get a good man to put against me."
