Murray Shanks of athletic fame is also a student of law and as a writer and orator ranks high with his classmates.

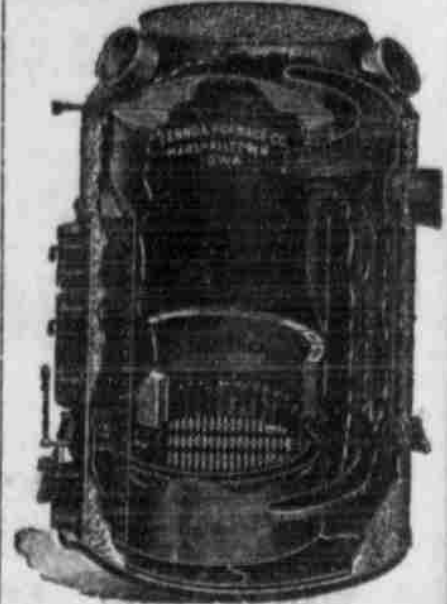
H. S. Hardman belongs to the liberal arts department of the school and has the power of delivering deep and logical reasoning in an eloquent manner.
