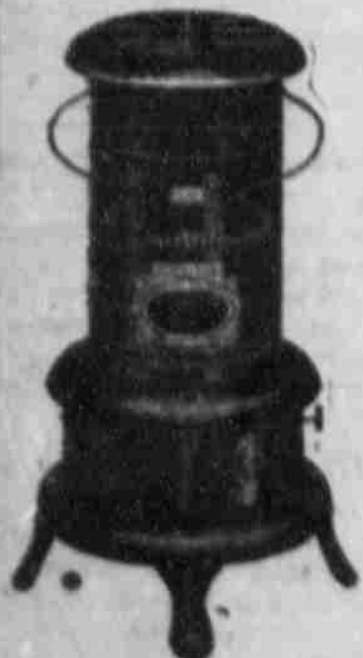

The fleet weighed anchor and sailed early today from Possession bay, twenty miles west, where the strait proper begins.

THAW IS NOT GUILTY

(Continued from First Page.)

If it crossed his mind at all, an indistinct and inconsequential shadow beating in his ears like the incessant roll and surge of the angry breakers of the sea were the words of the foreman: "Not guilty on the ground of insanity."

"Life—the right to claim his own—was his again.

Let it be recorded that Harry K. Thaw, "White Knight," as he was pictured by Delphin M. Delmas, or mentally weak, as he was described by Martin W. Littleton, thought of himself and only of himself in the crucial moment prior to the reading of the verdict. He was frightened. His eyes bulged. His lips were ashen. The horrid picture of the chair of death appeared close to him.

When the foreman's words so suddenly tore the dread vision away and he again realized that his grasp on life was again secure, his whole being relaxed in a spasm of relief.

Following the call for the judge, Thaw was summoned, also his family. The court room was packed. The atmosphere palpitated with the excitement of the moment. Thaw was apparently composed until the jury appeared. Then his sallow face recorded the fear that racked his brain. Evelyn was painfully nervous, her hands fluttering from her head to her lap and from her lap to her hat again.

When Clerk Peuny read the verdict her face lighted up for an instant, then, realizing its full import, she drooped again. Immediately after the jury returned the verdict, Justice Dowling committed Thaw to Mattewan, "subject to possible recovery."

The jury was out just 25 hours and is said to have taken a dozen ballots. The last ballot prior to the decisive one stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction in some degree less than the first.

After a conference between Littleton, O'Reilly and Peabody, Justice Dowling was notified that counsel for the defense would not oppose the order committing Thaw to Mattewan. Thaw's wife and brother also participated in the conference. The prisoner will be taken to the asylum on the 4:29 p. m. New York Central train.

GRANGE CONSIDERS IT.

Two-Cent Fares, Matters of Government and Questions of Revenue, Albany, Feb. 1.—The Linn County Grange Council held a meeting here today to decide whether to take up the fight for a two-cent fare rate for passengers in Oregon.

Oswald West, of the State Railroad Commission, appeared before them and answered questions as to relative importance of reduction of freight or passenger rates. Col. E. Hofer, of Salem, presented a plan for preparing a budget for the state legislature similar to the plan now employed for restraining city councils and county courts from exceeding estimates for fixed charges. He showed that the state government can be conducted by collecting a little more indirect taxes and limiting the state direct tax to two mills. It was shown that if this was done there would be sufficient revenues to meet all legitimate demands for higher education and carry on the state government for one-third less than at present, when the cost was more than three dollars per capita. The plan was endorsed by the unanimous vote of the grangers present.

Portland, Or., Feb. 1.—"I did not steal the letter from the Santa Fe offices quoted in the President's message yesterday, as was alleged by one of the railroad men," said Francis J. Heney last night, when shown the dispatch from Los Angeles, "but I decline to say how it came into my possession. This is not the only letter I have, and they will make interesting reading when the proper time comes for giving them out. I sent the letter to the President, because Ripley had taken it upon himself to criticize the President. The letter came into my possession just before I left San Francisco, but I did not get a chance to send it to the President until I reached Portland."

FRUIT GROWERS GET DESERTS

Los Angeles, Feb. 1.—The very latest phase of the yellow peril is a union formed by Japanese orange-pickers. The union has been quick to put in a demand for larger pay and shorter hours, and ranchers are worried for they hate to give in to the demands, yet if they refuse the fruit may rot on the trees.

A large number of Japanese are employed in the fruitgrowing country tributary to the city. Most of them are pickers, while others are connected with the irrigation work. Until lately their services could be secured at from 10 to 15 cents per hour. Now that the union has been formed they demand 20 cents per hour as the minimum wage. Further than this they want a steady job. They cannot be hired for the season, but must be taken on for the year. That, at 20 cents per hour, does not look good to the ranchers, for in the aggregate it means a loss to them of many thousand dollars annually.

LABOR TROUBLE IN THE TANANA

Fairbanks, Alaska, Feb. 1.—At a meeting representing 56 business houses, a committee consisting of George Preston, Ray Brumbaugh and James S. Rogers was appointed today to investigate the labor situation and devise means for the settlement of labor troubles, which are now threatening the future of the Tanana.

The Western Federation of Miners has ordered a strike today of all men who are not paid \$5 a day, board and lodging, for an eight-hour day. The operators contend the ground won't stand the scale, and will refuse the demands.
