IS THERE A REPUBLICAN PARTY IN OREGON?

A Portland paper that has posed as the Republican organ, is saying over and over, there is no longer a Republican party in Oregon.

It says it will no longer be counted upon to play the part of the party organ, that there is no party left, and if there is one it must RUN ALONG AS BEST IT MAY WITHOUT THE SUPPORT OF THE AFORESAID ORGAN.

It predicates its assertions on the fact that some of the choicest offices in the gift of the people have been awarded to the opposition, and because certain Republican candidates have been defeated.

It is worth while to recount a little political history since 1902, when Oregon began electing Democrats TO THE MOST DESIRED POSITIONS OF TRUST AND HONOR.

In the primaries of the spring of 1902—the good old-style primaries—the Mitchell faction at Portland wanted to do up the Simon faction, and a candidate for Governor was needed who had money to put into the fight at Portland. FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS WAS NEEDED TO MAKE A SLATE ACCORDING TO PROGRAM.

Al Crossman and Jack Mathews who were then in the postoffice formed a combination by which Furnish was to be given the delegation from Multnomah county for governor. Scott was to have the delegation from United States senator, and Fulton and Geer were to be left holding THE SACK IN THE GREAT POLITICAL SNIPER-SHAPE.

As yet according to program, Furnish under the whip and spur of the anti rule got the solid support of Multnomah and was nominated. Geer was kicked out, and while Fulton was allowed to lead the Furnish fight IT WAS NEVER INTENDED FOR HIM TO RECEIVE THE HONORS OF THE SENATORSHIP.

But a few independents like Nottingham and Banks and others broke into the Multnomah delegation, and in the end Fulton was made senator.

The corruption of that campaign was so notorious that decent people not only bolted the Republican nominee for governor but RESOLVED TO HAVE A DIRECT PRIMARY LAW.

A direct primary law had been drawn up by a commission named by Governor Geer the preceding summer, but Senator McGillin and his followers killed it in the senate.

Next chapter in Oregon politics, the same gentlemen figured as

sponsors for the present direct primary law, and their names are printed on the original measure.

The U'Ren direct primary law, endorsed and approved by the Oregonian WAS NOT WELL RECEIVED IN THIS COUNTY, and a large majority was cast against it at the June election of 1904.

Judge John B. Waldo, now dead, wrote an able exposition of its workings, and it was published in this paper, but the Oregonian denied him the use of its columns, as it was the especial champion of the bill and Mr. U'Ren had been wily enough to close the columns of all the Portland newspapers against any criticisms of his measure.

The present conspiracy against the direct primary is entirely selfish, and the charge that it has disorganized the Republican party is false because all that is recited above took place long before the law was adopted.

A Democratic governor, Democratic mayors of Portland, Democratic district attorneys and sheriff were elected in Multnomah county, not because of the direct primary and Statement No. 1, BUT BEFORE IT WAS THE LAW, AS THE RECORDS WILL SHOW.

Republicans resented not Republican party principles but factional manipulation of the Republican party for personal ends.

Today if an official does not do the bidding of the Oregonian he is tabu.

It amounts to this then: If you are not satisfactory to the regency of the Oregonian you are not a good Republican and NOT WANTED IN ANY PUBLIC POSITION.

If a candidate or an official wears the Oregonian collar he is NOT WANTED BY THE PEOPLE OF PORTLAND OR THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE—that is, a majority of them.

Instead of their being no Republican party in Oregon, there is a Republican party but it will not wear a collar, AND BE LABELLED "I AM ON THE BARGAIN COUNTER."

The whole fight today in Oregon is to force the next legislature into a position where it must name a rotten "boughten" Republican senator or name a Democrat.

There is no Republican outside of the Oregonian office good enough to be senator or to remain in the senate MORE THAN ONE TERM IF BY ACCIDENT HE GETS IN THERE.

There is as much of a Republican party in Oregon as ever there was, and the result of the next election will show it to be a fact, unless the overthrow the direct primary is made a Republican issue.

The present plan is to split the Republican party into two factions and elect a Democrat or drive Republicans back to the old plan of BUYING THE SENATORSHIP WITH A SACK, AND FEDERAL OFFICES.

While flattering Roosevelt and pretending to be for reforms, the Oregonian is really fighting to overthrow popular choice of senators, and get Oregon back into the ranks of the rotten-burrough states.

While Iowa, Illinois, Washington and other great states are adopting the Oregon plan of selecting senators, a little coterie of Portland corruptionists are asking the people of this state to give up all they have achieved, AND RETURN TO SWILL-BARREL METHODS.

Will the Republicans of Oregon be driven like sheep to take the side of the plutocracy and let the next senatorship be put up at bargain and sale or will they stand by the direct primary law?

The Capital Journal did not support the present primary law, but it was solemnly enacted by the people, no one is proposing to repeal it, and it should be obeyed and not made a mockery in the interest of those who want to return to corrupt practices that the people have hoped and prayed would be discarded.

MANY NEW MEASURES And Some Old Ones to Be Submitted to a Popular Vote.

The voters of Oregon will be asked to vote upon 19 measures at the June election. Briefly stated the measures are as follows:

- Submitted by the legislature— Amendment increasing compensation of members of the legislature to \$400 for a regular session and \$10 a day for special sessions. Amendment permitting the location of state institutions away from the capital. Amendment increasing the number of supreme judges to five and extending the jurisdiction of circuit courts to probate work; also requiring provision by law for district attorneys, county courts, etc.
