WORKING TOWARD THE COAST.
Milwaukee Is Pushing Construction Work Vigorously.
"The work of pushing the Milwaukee to the coast is being done as fast as labor and money can accomplish it," said P. M. Ryan, a well-known railroad contractor, who has recently returned to Missoula, Mont. from the Idaho-Montana line to the St. Joe river, a distance of 43 miles, says the Spokane Chronicle.

"A large number of freighting teams are working out of Taft hauling supplies to the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul right-of-way and three teams carry 15 carloads of powder and supplies every day to the different camps along the line.
"Engineer Day, who is in charge of the Milwaukee work from the Montana line to beyond St. Joe, is stationed at Taft. The work is divided up into sections of six miles each, and over each of these is a resident engineer with three assistants. The

work is well systematized and is progressing rapidly."
In all there are 6000 men employed on the work from the Montana line to St. Joe, and as these men get \$2.25 a day, it can easily be seen that, with the salaries of the engineers, the daily payroll of the Milwaukee for the work down the St. Joe is \$15,000 or over.
"The work of laying steel will begin in about a year on most of the line, although in places I expect steel will be laid before that.

"A wagon road traverses the entire distance from Taft to St. Joe along the right-of-way, with the exception of three miles, and those three miles mark the dividing line between the freighters from St. Joe and those from Taft. There are 20 camps in all, of which 17 are between Taft and the mouth of the north fork, being fed from St. Joe. The break in the road comes at the mouth of the north fork."--East Oregonian.

You Can Pay Taxes Now--
The assessment roll for Marion county was opened for the collection of the 1907 taxes in the sheriff's office this afternoon. Charles Elgin, the accommodating registration clerk, has the distinction of holding receipt No. 1.
The Dignam Will--
The last will and testament of the late Joseph Dignam was filed today in probate. The will, in part, is as follows: "I give, devise and Rev. E. P. Murphy, rector of the Catholic

church at Salem, Oregon, \$1000, to be used by him as he may deem proper. I give, devise and bequeath to the society of the Sisters of the Holy Name of Jesus and Mary all the real and personal property that I may own at the time of my death, after the payment of the above bequest of Rev. E. P. Murphy, and the payment of debts, funeral expenses, expenses of administration and the costs of a monument." P. H. D'Arcy has been appointed executor of the estate, which is valued at \$13,250.
