SOLEMN WARNING TO CZAR.

Russian Paper Hints He May Share Carlos' Fate.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—The tragic occurrences at Lisbon have created a deep impression on all sections of society here, and the newspapers that appeared yesterday comment freely on the events that occurred.

The Rum, in a daring style, draws a thinly veiled parallel between conditions in Portugal and Russia and warns the government in almost as many words that there is danger of a similar event here.

The lamentable and awful tragedy in Portugal, the paper says, was due to the fact that the king did not understand his people, and was attempting to show by dictatorial methods of repression the irresistible striving of the masses to take part in the government. The tragedy happened at the very moment when Premier Franco seemingly had succeeded in restoring order by a series of unprecedented repressive measures.

The Novoe Vremya, although attributing the direct execution of the plot to anarchists, to whom all government is obnoxious, also connects the crime and the dictatorship of Franco, which met with both open and secret resistance from all political parties.

STEAMER BURNS AND 47 ARE DROWNED.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 4.—In the midst of a wild blizzard this afternoon the steamer St. Cuthbert was burned to the water's edge off the Nova Scotia coast. Fifteen members of the crew were drowned by the swamping of the small boat in which they attempted to leave the vessel after fire had broken out yesterday. The other 37 members of the crew, including the captain, were rescued by the White Star liner

Cymric. After taking off the survivors, the Cymric abandoned the burning vessel this afternoon and proceeded to Boston.

ASIATIC EXCLUSION LEAGUE IS FORMED.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Feb. 4.—The North American Asiatic Exclusion League was officially brought into existence this morning at Labor Temple by the convention of Northwestern delegates. Immediately following the organization of the league, the following committee was appointed to frame the constitution, consideration of which was made the special order at the afternoon session:

C. F. Knight, San Francisco, chairman; W. S. Wright, Seattle; C. S. Fey, Seattle; Leo Lovenstein, Seattle; H. C. Pope, Eureka, Cal.; L. L. Gifford, Bellingham; R. B. Heskot, Seattle; E. C. Loomis, Colorado; J. O. Walsh, San Francisco.

Reports were read from the local organizations of Seattle, Tacoma, Vancouver, Spokane, Bellingham, Everett, Olympia, Portland and Denver.

MEMBERS OF THE ICE TRUST ARE SENT TO JAIL.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Toledo, Feb. 4.—R. A. Bard, R. Clemens and Joseph Miller, convicted as members of the Toledo ice trust, were sentenced to six months in the county jail today by Judge Kincaid. The men were convicted in a long trial before Judge Kincaid in 1906, and were sentenced to the work house. They appealed to the supreme court, and their cases were remanded for hearing. The original sentence carried a fine of \$2500, but the judge remitted this and fixed them the costs of the suit in connection with their jail sentence.

BURNED TOBACCO AND A DISTILLERY.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Dyersburg, Ky., Feb. 4.—Early today 200 mounted night riders raided the warehouse of A. C. Bennett and burned all the tobacco in it and a distillery nearby, also destroying thousands of tobacco plants. Telephone and telegraph wires were cut and no assistance could be obtained until long after the riders escaped.

Burned by Explosion.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Feb. 4.—W. Bell, an engineer, was seriously burned early this morning by the explosion of the Seattle Brewing Company launch Rainier, in which he was sleeping at the foot of Whatcous street. Bell was forced to abandon his clothing by the fire which enveloped the boat, and, only clad in a blanket, made his way through the flames to the float to which the boat was tied. Then he fell exhausted, bleeding and burned. Bell does not know how the explosion occurred.

One Officer, But No Army.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Feb. 4.—A. W. Moore, who claimed to be the general of a religious army, but whose ranks are shadows, was released from custody this morning, and ordered out of town.

Moore was arrested Saturday by Patrolman Dolphin on complaint of officers of the Salvation Army, who asserted that Moore's plan is to collect money for the establishment of a branch of his alleged "army," and then disappear.

Government Runs a Newspaper.

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Senator Carter, of Montana, and Tom Flint, of California, warmly defended the publication of a Panama canal newspaper by the government in the senate today, when Culberson, Tillman and Bacon opposed the expending of a part of \$12,000,000 for the canal for that purpose.

Proposed Electric Road.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 4.—A proposition of an electric line to connect Seattle and Tacoma via Vashon Island, has been broached by F. X. Waldron & Company, of this city, and the county commissioners will have a hearing on next Tuesday on the question of granting a franchise. The promoters ask for a franchise running 49 years, and for which they do not want any conditions or remuneration named.

About Pensions.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Feb. 4.—The pension appropriation bill, carrying a total of \$150,000,000 for the fiscal year, abolishing 15 agencies, among them San Francisco, was reported favorably by the house appropriations committee today.

WHEN OREGON HAD CAMELS

That the whole interior Oregon was once the bed of the Pacific ocean has been proved beyond question by the investigation of Professor Thos. Condon, Dr. Miller and other noted geologists. That the region was later a tropical country has been equally well established, says Sunset Magazine.

Numerous discoveries of the bones of animals and rocks containing the perfect imprint of the plants of the tropics have been made, and it is no longer an occasion for surprise when well diggers or irrigation excavators unearth the fossil remains of a camel or a broad faced ox.

Within recent years many fossil beds of beautiful palm leaves have been found in eastern Oregon.

The Cascade hills, Blue mountains and Owyhees, once islands surrounded by tropical lakes, were covered with luxuriant growth, forests and flowering shrubs, for Knowlton tells us the magnolia and cinnamon and fig trees were there.

Today the soil presents a finely ground mixture of basalt and volcanic ash, containing the elements of the most fertile soil, and when properly watered producing enormous crops of vegetables, fruits and grains common to temperate zones.

The climate has been changed, says Professor Condon, by the up-folding of the Cascade range, shutting off from the interior the softening influence of the Japan current and the drift of ocean fogs and clouds.
