Property Sold to Gillermann.

The corner on State and High streets, known as the Masonic property, as was stated in The Journal, has been sold to a Seattle business man for the sum of \$7500. The first payment on the contract, which was accepted last Friday evening, was tendered yesterday, and one of the most valuable properties in the city passed into the possession of A. B. L. Gillermann, the manager of the Nickelodian circuit of 5-cent theaters. Mr. Gillermann says that he has confidence in the future of the city, and will soon begin the erection of a building on the property. It has not been definitely decided as to the size of the building, but Mr. Gillermann is prepared to build a three or four-story modern structure if, after looking over the field, he sees a demand for a building of that size.

A substantial brick, suited for the Nickelodian, will be constructed immediately.

Mr. Gillermann is an influential business man of Seattle, who has large interests in the circuit of 5-cent picture theaters, which are established in various cities on the coast.

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Supreme Court Opinions.

Holding of a minor, if of immature age, inexperience or want of comprehension, does not appreciate the danger of his employment, although it is open and apparent that it is the duty of the master to caution him of it, and instruct him how to avoid it, the supreme court affirmed the decree of Judge Alfred F. Sears, of the circuit court for Multnomah county, in which Roscoe Mogon, a minor, was awarded damages in the sum of \$1400 against the Portland Manufacturing Company while employed in defendant's sawmill at St. John. The opinion was written by Justice Eakin.

In an opinion written by Justice Moore the decree of Judge George H. Burnett is reversed and a new trial ordered in the case of J. H. Johnson, respondent, vs. The Sheridan Lumber Company, an appeal from the circuit court from Marion county, the appellate court rules that the trial court erred in refusing to admit the amended answer in evidence, and in holding that an averment in that pleading afforded competent proof of defendant's execution of a promissory note for \$4200 the basis of the action.

Other cases decided were: William C. Smith, et al., appellants, vs. Benjamin F. and Emery Smith, respondents, from Multnomah county; M. C. George, judge; reversed; opinion by Chief Justice Bean.

Louise Hornelius, respondent, vs. William J. Wilkinson, appellant, from Umatilla county; H. J. Bean, judge; affirmed; opinion by Judge King.

W. F. Matlock, respondent, vs. Jacob Sheuerman, appellant, from Umatilla county; J. H. Raley, judge; affirmed; opinion by Judge Slater.

A matter that will be of interest to lawyers was the decision of a rather nice point in the case of Kunz vs. O. R. & N. A non-suit was granted in the lower court, and yesterday Judge Moreland, clerk of the supreme court, was called upon to pass on an item of \$85 in the bill of disbursements to cover the cost of stenographic work. The clerk disallowed the bill, and his action was upheld by the court.

The case of S. T. Richardson vs. the city of Salem was argued in the supreme court yesterday.
