

WILL RACE FOR BIG MONEY

Match Horse Race at Prineville Will Be Run in May for \$2000.

Ever since the Prineville race meet last fall there has been a controversy as to the relative merits of "Brandy," a race horse owned by Meyer and Brown of Paulina, and "Patsy Brown," a fleet footed one owned by T. F. Buchanan, proprietor of the Hamilton stables, says the Prineville Journal. Backers of both horses have got together and a race for a purse of \$2000 is the result. The date is set for May 5. One thousand dollars has been posted with Granville Clifton of the firm of Clifton & Cornett, and the balance of the purse must be put up on or before the day of the race. The horses are to run a quarter of a mile.
