

ROBERTSON RESIDENCE ROBBED

MADE A GOOD HAUL

BURGLAR WENT THROUGH DR. C. H. ROBERTSON'S RESIDENCE HELPING HIMSELF TO WHAT-EVER HE LIKED BEST, AND, THOUGH DISCOVERED, ESCAPED.

The residence of Dr. C. H. Robertson, 277 Capital street, was entered and robbed last night while the family slept, the robber getting about \$30 cash and \$200 worth of gold watches and jewelry. He took Dr. Robertson's watch and Knights Templar jewel and his wife's jewels right off the dresser beside their bed, and came back the second time to get more, when Mrs. Robertson awoke her husband and said:

"Doctor, get your gun, there is a man in the house."

Mrs. Robertson saw the flash of his light, as he turned to go back down stairs. Dr. Robertson found his revolver, but, unfortunately, it was not loaded. By the time he had it loaded, the man had slid down stairs, and was off down the back alley. If Dr. Robertson had got his presence of mind in time he might have downed him with a loaded shotgun that stood right handy, as he passed the back window. But luck was on the side of the man who wore the mask and gum shoes.

The fellow made nearly a clean sweep of everything valuable in sight, and did so well the first time he ventured back the second.

The residence of Charles Knowland on Cottage street was also ransacked last night. Upon the return home of Mr. and Mrs. Knowland they made the discovery that there had been some one there during their absence. The house had been gone through pretty thoroughly but nothing has been missed. The would-be burglar overlooked a couple of unmounted diamonds and some money which were in the house.

This burglar was evidently ignorant of the fact that Mr. Knowland is a printer, or he would not have bothered to stop at his house.

TEDDY SUSPENDS PUBLIC PRINTER

Washington, Feb. 5.—A sensation was created in Washington today when President Roosevelt suspended Public Printer Charles A. Stillings, pending an investigation, on charges of extravagance.

William Rositter, chief clerk in the census bureau, was temporarily appointed in Stillings' place, pending the investigation.

For years it has been common report in Washington that the government was annually losing thousands of dollars in the "book mill," as the bureau is called. It has been charged that the system of checking up the use of supplies is exceedingly lax, and that the contracts have been awarded to favorites. Three years ago it was rumored that an investigation would be ordered, but nothing came of it. Sensational developments are expected, and it is believed that if actual graft is not shown up, loose management and carelessness in the handling of government property will be found.

A New Beach Line at Nome.

Nome, Alaska, Feb. 5.—A new beach line has been discovered north of the submarine channel, two miles north of this city. Good pay has been struck, but the extent as yet has not been determined. The new find has stimulated interest in the properties west and north of the city.

THE FAIRBANK'S LABOR TROUBLES

Fairbanks, Alaska, Feb. 5.—United States troops from Fort Gibbon may be called here to prevent labor disorders. The miners' strike has failed but there is a rough element who threaten to terrorize the district by intimidating non-union men. The stage to Esther creek, containing several non-union men, was held up, and the ringleaders of the mob forced the non-unionists to return to town under threat.

Marshal Perry immediately swore in extra deputies, and issued orders to bring in every member of the rougher element in camp. Order will be preserved, and today Marshal Perry announced that he would request the presence of soldiers, if disturbances continued.
Every plant on the creeks is now working full time with non-union miners. The latter are being paid \$5 a day with board and lodging. The mine owners have asked for protection, and this will be given, if the soldiers must afford it.

VENERABLE DIVINE ENDS LIFE'S WORK.

Bellingham, Wash., Feb. 5.—Ending a career as a minister that extended over 40 years death came to the Rev. William Addison Sample, D. D., yesterday evening at 4:45 o'clock in his home in South Bellingham. Heart disease was the cause of the death.

Mr. Sample was one of the best known pastors in the Presbyterian church in the western part of the state, and had reached the age of 70 years when he passed away. Forty years ago he was ordained and began work as a missionary in the church at Fort Worth, Arkansas.
The Rev. Mr. Sample was born in Charlotte, N. C., June 25, 1838.

DOG TEAMS TO RACE 400 MILES.

Nome, Alaska, Feb. 5.—Cold weather has not chilled the blood of this community apparently, for yesterday marked the offer of a prize of \$2500 for a dog team race between this city and Chandle and return. A club has been formed in the city for the purpose of improving the breed of dogs now in use for traveling or freighting purposes. The total distance to be covered is approximately 400 miles, and is the severest test that can be made. The start from this city will be made on April 1.
