REPUBLICANS FAVOR THE CONVENTION PLAN

Old Line Party Leaders Are Opposed to the Direct Primary and Especially to Statement No. One

A number of Republican leaders met quietly Monday night and decided to return to the convention plan of making a ticket, and opposition was manifested in the party against the direct primary and statement No. 1. It was also determined to have a short campaign. No publicity was given to the meeting, but it is known that the following were present: F. A. Turner, John Knight, C. B. Moores, L. T. Reynolds, Dr. J. N. Smith, A. N. Gilbert, F. B. Southwick, C. A. Murphy, Alex Lafollette and T. B. Jones.

"There was nothing secret about the meeting," said John Knight. "We believe it is time for the Republicans to get together and cut out all this nonsense that results in the election of Democrats to office. We were unanimous in favoring a county convention, and Chairman C. A. Murphy of the Republican county central committee, has agreed to call his committee together Saturday. A call

will be issued before the primaries and for the purpose of recommending candidates to be voted for at the primaries. I presume that delegates to the convention will be apportioned among the several precincts, as under the former system, so that each portion of the county will be represented."

"Were there any statement No. 1 people present at the meeting?" Mr. Knight was asked.

"No, sir," and we did not want them. The meeting was held largely for the purpose of cutting out that kind of people. We were unanimous against statement No. 1. We believe that if a candidate for the legislature pledges himself at all, it should be only to the extent of supporting the Republican voters' choice for senator. We don't believe a Republican should pledge himself to vote for a Democrat, if a Democrat should get the popular in-dorsement in June."

NEGRO MURDERER IS ARRESTED

His Captors Will Get \$5000 Reward If He Proves to be the Right Man — Was Arrested in Tacoma Wednesday.

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 6.—Detectives yesterday arrested Hayden Peoples, alias William Marshall, a negro, on information furnished by a bartender here, who formerly lived at St. Joseph, Mo., where the crime for which the negro is wanted was committed. The negro, a porter at the time for Henry Siferd, a prominent saloon keeper at Eighth and Felix streets, who was found dead one morning in his saloon, having been struck on the head with a hammer. The city council offered a reward of \$3000, to which was added \$2000 by the family of the murdered man for the capture of the negro, who has been a fugitive since May 29, 1904. Peoples maintains a stolid indifference, however, admitting the St. Joseph police have been hunting for him since he left the city, and he refuses to either affirm or deny that he is the right man. The St. Joseph police have been notified.

WOULD FREE THE PHILIPPINES

Washington, Feb. 6.—In a resolution offered Wednesday upon which he intends to deliver a speech, Senator Stone, of Missouri, sets forth a definite program for the disposition of the Philippine Islands by the United States government, and names December 10, 1913, as the date upon which the government shall give the islands complete independence.

As a preliminary to the final step, the resolution instructs the President to open negotiations with other nations, "for the purpose of securing an agreement with them for the neutralization of the Philippine islands, and the recognition of their independence, whenever the same shall be granted by the United States."

December 10 is chosen because it is the anniversary of the signing of the treaty of Paris in 1898, whereby the Philippines passed from Spanish to American control.

FLEET WILL STAY AT PUNTA ARENAS TWO DAYS.

Punta Arenas, Feb. 6.—Rear-Admiral Evans has decided that a visit of two extra days here would not interfere with any of his plans during the remainder of his trip to San Francisco bay, and he has announced that such a stay will be made.

This will give him an opportunity to return the courtesies showered upon himself and his officers by the Chileans. The squadron was originally scheduled to sail from Punta Arenas yesterday. The fleet will be off Valparaiso harbor on February 14.

SEVERAL HACKS WERE WRECKED

Casual demand for hacks Wednesday night to enable society people to reach the dancing party at the Elmer hall caused a number of wrecks. The hacks are laid out in South Salem. One on Lafelle streets is down and to be repaired, and will require a derrick to extricate it. Another was in the ditch that has been dug along Bush street to carry water off the low ground east of Commercial street. The property owners got permission to dig the ditch from the city council, but when it came to buying the ditch the point was sprung that it was a local improvement, and could not be paid for out of the general fund. So the ditch, from three to four feet deep and a quarter of a mile long, has stood open all winter, and the hack that was wrecked in it last night will probably have to be repaired by the city. So far no one has been hurt, and the city has no damage suits for broken limbs, as it probably will have if the ditch remains open.
