REPUBLICANS ARE DIVIDED

Some Republican leaders of prominence have taken the position at Salem that they desire to restore the convention system of making nominations for office.

They have taken steps to call a county convention and have expressed themselves as OPPOSED TO ANY REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE SIGNING STATEMENT NO. 1.

They have a perfect right to do this, and The Capital Journal two years ago supported Republican candidates regardless of whether they had signed that statement or not.

That statement pledges a candidate for the legislature to always vote for the choice of the people for the United States senator, and SOME REPUBLICANS SIGNED THE STATEMENT AND SOME DID NOT.

Those who signed the statement and those who did not, with very few exceptions, voted for the choice of the people at the primaries and at the election that followed.

The Capital Journal does not believe signing Statement No. 1 is a test of Republicanism nor does it believe that not signing the statement SHOULD BE MADE A TEST OF REPUBLICANISM.

The people have a right as voters to apply the test, and have a right to make it an issue for or against a candidate, and candidates are at liberty to make their own choice.

On these broad lines there is no reason for division within the Republican party, any more than there is over SUPPORTING ROOSEVELT'S POLICIES OR NOT SUPPORTING THEM.

Is the Republican party entering upon its decadence, and is it going to divide on minor matters that do not involve its cardinal principles? But the Republican party should not be put in the attitude of opposing majority rule on any office. IT SHOULD REMAIN THE PARTY OF THE PEOPLE.

ALBANY AND LOCAL OPTION

Justice O. T. Porter Thursday morning sentenced Fred Dawson, proprietor of a local pharmacy to pay a fine of \$200 and costs for violation of the local option law. Dawson was convicted of selling liquor contrary to the law yesterday by a jury. Notice of appeal to the circuit court was at once given by the defendant's attorney, J. R. Wyatt, and the defendant was released on bonds.

Carson Holt, of Harrisburg, whose trial was set for yesterday, entered a plea of guilty to the charge of violating the local option law in selling liquor to Detective Marsh, was fined by Justice Porter in the sum of \$75 and costs, which he paid. The hearing of Peter Anderson, who was tried on a local option charge a few weeks ago, the jury disagreeing, will take place Wednesday, February 12. With the conclusion of the Anderson trial, the second trial of Richard Landis and Burkhardt & Lee, local druggists, will be taken up by Prosecuting Attorney Gale S. Gill. From present indications the local option cases will not be concluded before summer, as in nearly all the cases appeals have been taken from the judgment in the justice court to the circuit court.—Albany Herald.

Manhattan's Hanging Garden. When Nebuchadnezzar's queen complained of the flatness of Babylon, remembering the hills of her native Media, the king built for her the Hanging Gardens. It is perhaps, in response to somebody's feeling of a dead level of elaboration in the white-light district that plans have been drawn for an elevated lake and summer garden on Broadway. Standing in Long Acre square, when this dream is fulfilled, one shall look upward to see real trees and real shrubbery growing from truly mossy banks in air.

Being a strictly modern Babylon, however, New York will not terrace its hanging garden. Instead, it will place underneath a gorgeous dining hall to eclipse every existing restaurant and to seat 8000 persons. That is the rest of the dream: There are cynical persons who, given the first part of this proposition, would have said at once, "Scratch the garden and find a new lobster palace."

Over this newly planned resort the epicures will express no pleasure. These sensitive persons tell us that evolution has gone backward with New York in respect to its dining and supping; that we have become a voracious city, but a city without taste, fond of garish displays, indulging not according to our palates, but our purses. The garden block in Broadway will cost a few millions. We spend now—we and our visitors—almost \$4,000,000 a day for food and drink. But who can buy at any price the fine judgment and appreciation which are the wealth of the table connoisseur? Nevertheless, it will be cool and fascinating up by the elevated Long Acre lake, while down with the lights and the band below the latest improved Babylon will not so much hasten to its fall as accelerate its dyspepsia.—New York World.
