She had previously been engaged by the Argabrites to be present when the stork should come to their home. Miss McDermott sent back word that she would be in town the next day, Monday. All day Sunday and all Sunday night the rain came down in torrents in the Matilija canyon where the springs are located. The creeks and rivers flowed in swift yellow floods on Monday morning. Despite this and the protests of her friends at the springs, Miss McDermott determined to make the trip. In order to be better prepared for the perilous journey she donned male attire and then set out over the slippery trails. She finally reached the Meyers' spring it was six miles to the railroad, and although the river flowed between, she started out. The plucky girl at last reached a place near the Sheldon ranch where she could go no further without crossing the Ventura river. She had Sheldon make fast a rope to her waist to keep her from being washed down stream and then unhesitatingly plunged into the icy flood. After a desperate struggle she scrambled up the opposite bank and continued her walk and finally reached the Argabrite home "on time."
