PINE GROVE GRANGE.

Hood River Society Has Finest Hall in the State.

Hood River, Feb. 7.—The new grange hall recently completed by Pine Grove Grange, at an expenditure of between \$6000 and \$7000, and said to be one of the finest in the state, will be dedicated February 12. The dedicatory address will be made by State Master A. T. Buxton, and an address will be made by Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, state lecturer, who will take as her subject the life of Lincoln, February 12th being the 100th anniversary of the great President's birth. State Organizer J. C. Voorhees and State Secretary Mary Howard are expected to participate in the exercises.

The new hall is two stories high, with an auditorium 44x80 feet. It is supplied with a well-equipped stage, including scenery for dramatic performances, a dining hall 20x40 feet and a kitchen. The building is electric lighted, the lines of the company having been extended to Pine Grove especially for this purpose.

A \$500 piano was a recent gift to the grange from the younger members.

GETTING AS FAR FROM PORTUGAL AS POSSIBLE.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, Feb. 7.—Ex-Premier Franco, of Portugal, arrived here today, and gave out his first interview since the assassination of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz.

"Saturday's tragedy," he said, "was a blow which struck me to the heart. I retain full confidence in my country, and am most hopeful for her future. I assured King Manuel when I resigned that the royalist party would rally around the throne.

"My friends, I know, will give the ministry their full support. It will be wise for me to live hereafter far from my native land and its politics, which I have definitely and forever abandoned. I leave to time, judgment of my official conduct. I wish to formally deny the statement that Queen Amelia accused me of moral responsibility for the murder of her husband and son."
