The masses of the people can see good reasons why EVEN THE PRESIDENT SHOULD BE NOMINATED AND ELECTED BY A DIRECT VOTE OF THE PEOPLE.

There is pending an amendment to the election laws of this state for the very purpose of doing away with any necessity for Statement No. 1.

There has been initiated by the People's Power league a bill for a law to instruct the members of the legislative assembly TO VOTE FOR AND ELECT THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM OREGON.

The bill reads as follows: Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon: Section 1. That we, the people of the state of Oregon, hereby instruct our representatives and senators in our legislative assembly, as such officers, to vote for and elect the candidates for United States senator from this state WHO RECEIVE THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF VOTES AT OUR GENERAL ELECTIONS.
