San Francisco, Feb. 8.—San Francisco's smart set will not have to wait for the arrival of Fighting Bob Evans and his tars to prink itself out in its finest jewels and feathers.

LUMBER RATES UNSETTLED

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 8.—Until the Interstate Commerce Commission passes upon the reasonableness of the new lumber rates, neither the railroads nor the lumbermen apparently are willing to entertain a proposal for a compromise. At a conference between President Louis Hill of the Great Northern and President Howard Elliot of the Northern Pacific and the conciliation committee representatives, Frederick Bausman and Jacob Parth, it was shown that further effort toward settlement at this time would be futile.

That the railroads might make some concessions affecting details in the shipment of lumber was intimated by the railroad presidents. However, they declared that nothing of the sort could be arranged until they had been advised by counsel. At the present the railroads are enjoined from collecting any amount on lumber shipments in excess of the old rate. So long as the injunction is effective the railroads are bound to obey the court's order and they will not deviate in any degree. If anything outside of the injunction can be done by the railroads to facilitate shipments of lumber they are willing to meet any reasonable demand.

After the conference President Hill and President Elliot left for Tacoma and Portland.

PROVED HER ABILITY TO MAKE AFFINITY MATCHES.

Chicago, Feb. 8.—William Grable, who hails from Dearborn, Mo. and his bride, formerly Marion Grey, are chuckling merrily over a good joke they have played on the federal authorities. For, instead of taking the stand in the Federal Court to wreak revenge upon the young woman, as the government had expected, he will testify as her newly made husband.

Miss Marion Grey fell into the hands of Federal authorities a short time ago, because, in trying to make "affinity matches" she used the mail to defraud, according to the charge. Grable was to be one of the principle witnesses against her. He testified against her before the grand jury and the government depended upon him to give the strongest evidence at the coming trial. But now it is different. After careful consideration Grable came to the conclusion that Miss Grey was his affinity. His decision suited her, and now they are one. Grable is about the federal building today introducing his bride.

His Life for Twenty Cents.

Reno, Nev., Feb. 8.—Dan Bemo, whose occupation is that of a dry goods agent, is dying in jail here because he refused to pay 20 cents that was due on his laundry bill.

When he was arrested he was weak from a long illness, and his attorney, William Woodbury, Jr., said today that his client will be dead within a few hours, if he is not released. Bemo called at the laundry for his linen. He handed the proprietor 70 cents, but the bill was 90 cents. Bemo took the package and walked out, refusing to pay the extra 20 cents. The laundryman refuses to dismiss the charge.

ARRESTED BECAUSE HE HAD GOLD NUGGETS.
