THE NEW YORK CITY SCIENTIFIC MUSICAL CRITICS

Now that the musical critics have described the anatomy, the complexion and the acrobatic skill of Signorina Tetraxini's voice, won't one of them please tell us if she can sing? Such an elementary question is probably beneath their notice, but, in view of the popular interest in the new prima donna, it is only fair that the public without musical education and culture should know if there is such a thing as melody or music in her songs. We know from one distinguished authority that "in her medium register she uttered sounds empty of musical marrow," but what came from her other registers he does not say. Anyway, it is gratifying to learn that, despite her age, her coloratura is still swift and supple. Indeed, one critic assures us that her fame rests chiefly on its agility.

The anaemic condition of her tones was distressing, more particularly the lower notes, which have been described as "weak and pallid." Then it has been said that she sang her medium notes with a pinched glottis, reminding the critic of the wailing of a cross infant. Moreover, there is conflict of testimony elsewhere; but the weight of evidence is conclusive—the lower notes are afflicted with an attack of anaemia, though some of them are "luscious." So are some peaches, to say nothing of pears. Perhaps the best musical authority in the city assures us that her "lower ranges are pale and lacking both in power and color." It appears from this critic that the voice, like the human body, has many of its diseases localized, thereby avoiding a general breakdown; for he describes some of her other notes as full of warmth and color, though, unfortunately, he does not say just what shade. Inasmuch as he proceeds immediately to tell of other notes "dull and lusterless," it may be that the warm color is analogous to the hectic flush of a consumptive.

There is absolutely no agreement on this important phase of the Tetraxini case. Most of the critics decline to commit themselves to any definite color scheme, though it is implied that some of her tones are golden, or some other shining color, for they are "glittering." Also full of "strength and glitter" and "radiant with mellowness." Tetraxini's method is criticised. One critic says the "erispsness of her attack is unusual." Another complains that in staccato she does not attack her notes separately. As for her method of breathing, it is described as something new and different, but it is not stated whether she breathes before or after each note.

Critics will disagree so it is not surprising that they quarrel over her E flat. One critic says she sustained it with strength and clearness. Another more than corroborates him by asserting that her "E-flat was marvelous for substance and size," and that it was given with such ease and freedom that persons with a sense of absolute pitch doubted their sense. In contradiction another critic avers that it was nothing but a head tone of thin quality, and that it refused to stay on the pitch.—One other subject of dispute is the temperature of the color of her notes. One critic complains that she uses too much "cold color," and others rave over the warmth of the complexion of her notes. Obviously, the critics should be equipped with prisms and thermometers.—Brooklyn Eagle.
