

CARDINAL OPPOSES PROHIBITION

Gibbons Declares Temperance Should Be Promoted by Limiting Number of Saloons With High License - Wants the Laws Strictly Enforced

Cardinal Gibbons has given out the following interview:

"I am satisfied that it is practically impossible to put prohibition into effect in any large community and the means therefore to promote temperance is to limit the number of saloons by high license. I would favor inflicting heavy punishment on the proprietors of saloons who violate the law in the first instance and the second violation I would revoke the license altogether.

"In the country places I would suggest local option as an excellent means for the repression of intemperance, if in the judgment of the majority of the voters the sale of liquor should entirely be eliminated. "Laws like prohibition, had better not be made, for incessant violation draws down upon them disrespect."

KICKS AT TAXES.

Timber Land Owners Are Filled With Woes.

There is sadness in the bosom of one who owns Benton timber. He lives at Seattle. His holdings consist of 160 acres in the Alsea country. The quarter is valued for assessment purpose at \$4720, and the tax is \$119.42. He was notified the other day by Sheriff Burnett of the amount. The letter that came back nearly set the envelope on fire. The owner was amazed. He was more—he was thunderstruck. He was sure there must be some mistake, and asked for a bill of particulars. He used no cuss words, but they will come when the sheriff's answer goes back. It will relate that there is no mistake, and in cold chirography will state that the sum is \$119.42.

It so happens that in addition to the usual levy, the land is subject to a special road levy of 10 mills, voted by the Alseans. It will undoubtedly make the owner jump sideways, end ways and in all directions. In a moment of rage he will probably offer the tract for sale. Two Southern Pacific sections of timber land in the same vicinity are assessed, one at \$25,000 and the other at over \$26,000. The valuation is on a basis of 50 cents per thousand for standing timber.

A Douglas county man who owns a section in the same locality raised a big howl last year when he learned that the taxes on it was \$45. The tax this year is \$396. Douglas county will blaze with wrath when the day for the payment of that bill rolls around.—Corvallis Times.
