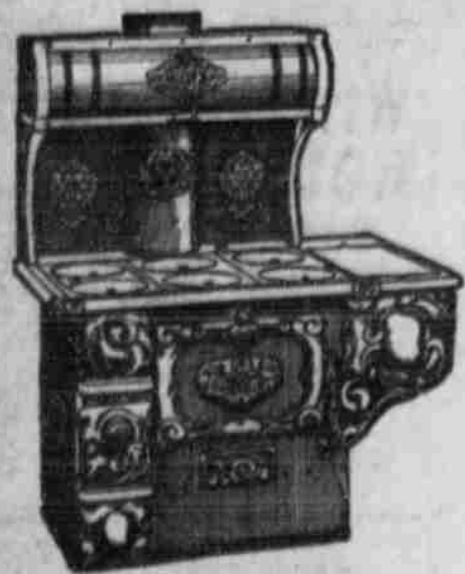

## FLIMFLAMMED TRUSTING LUIGO

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
 Seattle, Wash., Feb. 10.—Luigo Dondero, a well educated Italian, charged with securing \$1400 from Tony Parravicini by means of a clever bunco trick, was arrested yesterday at San Francisco, upon information furnished by the Seattle police. The money, it is charged, was secured on a steamship between Seattle and Victoria November 27.

According to the information Parravicini was separated from his money in the following manner. He met Luigo Dondero and Frank Perodi, both apparently well-to-do, on the boat going from Seattle to Victoria. Belong from the same country, they became acquainted quickly, and started talking of business. Parravicini mention the fact that he had \$1400 with him with which he hoped to start some business. He was immediately hired by the other two Italians to buy government lands for them somewhere in Alberta. Merely as a favor Parravicini was allowed to put some of his money into the scheme. He almost forced them to allow him to invest \$1400 in the enterprise in which he figured he could not lose, as he was to be the custodian of the entire amount of the purchase money. The money, including Parravicini's \$1400, was placed in a grip. He made the trip to Alberta without unlocking the grip, in which he believed the money to be. When he opened the grip he found it stuffed with newspapers.

Cole in Talking-ton's saloon last Saturday. Their bond has been set at \$200. Wilson and L. Smith, who, with D. D. McKay and F. W. Flannigan, are accused of having robbed Conreid Dillman's second-hand store last January, waived examination and their bonds will be set tomorrow at 1:30 o'clock, at which time McKay and Flannigan will be arraigned.

## QUAKE SHOOK HIM.

**HE SHOOK HIS WIFE.**

 New York, Feb. 10.—Earthquake and fire as an aid to affinity worship is the revelation made in a divorce granted today to Mrs. Salome V. Ford, of Brooklyn. She alleges that her husband, Homer B. Ford, utilized the San Francisco horror to make her believe him dead, so he could run away with his affinity. Ford was a street fair carnival artist, apparently devoted to his wife, until he went to San Francisco, several months before the earthquake. Letters ceased to come after the shock, and she mourned him as dead. Seeking to identify the body by certain marks, she wrote to the relief committee, and learned that Ford and "wife" had been sent to Seattle. Through her lawyer there she discovered that Ford was living with his affinity.

He also said if Marion county went dry the conditions would be as bad as in Sherman county, as the character of the population was such that there would be a large sale and consumption, and the cities and county would lose all revenues and costs, and taxes would be increased as a result.

## PAROLED BY JUDGE BURNETT

Tillamook, Or., Feb. 10.—Rather than see three young lives blasted by the stain of a penitentiary record Judge George H. Burnett has decided that he would parole Louis Loll, George Coppersmith and Walter Oliver, who plead guilty to breaking into a store. At the same time Judge Burnett announced the parole of Harry Long, Arthur Eherman and Harry Foster, who were found guilty of breaking into a warehouse. The sextette had been sentenced to two years in the state's prison. This was the first offense in each case. Drink and bad companions and an apparent lack of the proper realization of the duties of honest citizenship seemed to be the real cause of the downfall of the young men, and Judge Burnett decided that he would give them a chance to show their real worth. The terms of the parole were purposely made very liberal. The prisoners will report to the court twice a year. They must refrain from all intoxicating liquors and must not frequent pool rooms. They must work. Otherwise they are free to come and go about the state as they will. Judge Burnett declares that he feels confident that the paroled boys will find themselves and become useful and valuable citizens of the state.
