SHERIFF BRINGS HANSEN BACK

Brings Man Who Skipped With Team Back from New York City.

Hans Z. Hansen, who was arrested in New York city on January 21 last, on the charge of horse stealing preferred against him by C. W. Claggett of this city, was brought back here by Sheriff Wm. J. Culver Saturday evening.

Hansen leased a farm north of Salem from Claggett about a year ago. In June last he disappeared and it was discovered by Claggett that two horses and a wagon were gone. The matter was reported to Sheriff Culver, who began a search for the missing team. He soon found the stolen horses in the possession of a farmer in Yamhill county, who had bought them for \$300 and from whose description of the man who sold him the team it was deduced that Hansen was the thief. Subsequently Culver notified the police throughout the country to be on the watch for Hansen, and he soon received word that the latter had gone to his home in Norway. He returned to New York on January 21 and was immediately placed under arrest. Culver secured requisition papers, went to New York and got extradition papers from Governor Hughes permitting him to bring Hansen back to Salem.

Just previous to his disappearance Hansen married a Mrs. Robertson, a wealthy widow, with several children. She claimed to have been deserted by Hansen when he ran away and she left for California, professing to have no knowledge of her husband's whereabouts.

Hansen profited by his short association with criminals in the Tombs prison in New York city, and refuses to make any statement, fearing that by doing so he may commit himself. He has employed Attorney Webster Holmes to represent him.

Sheriff Culver had an enviable trip to the metropolis, weather being fine almost the entire time. He met many prominent politicians in the east and many Salemites, among the latter being Congressman W. C. Hawley, Ronald Glover, Benjamin Irving, W. P. Williams, D. C. Sherman, Miss Minnie Sherman and A. A. Cunningham. Congressman Hawley expects to be in Salem February 12.
