

TRUNKS IN GOLD STORAGE

ARE CLEARED OUT

ASYLUM BOARD ORDERS GENERAL CLEANING OUT OF OLD TRUNKS BROUGHT TO ASYLUM BY PATIENTS—CONTENTS ARE A STRANGE MEDLEY.

The asylum board has instructed that an inventory be made of the articles brought in by the insane at the time of their arrival, which has been stored in the garret of that institution and some of which has been there for 20 years, the owners of which have been dead for a long time.

There are stored away in the garret of the asylum more than a hundred trunks and about 300 valises and different styles of cases. Of these, the owners of 50 of the cases and 30 of the trunks are dead.

The trunks are of all styles and kinds; in size from the midget child's trunk to the mammoth size usually used more for the storing away of goods rather than for the moving of them. There are trunks which are so, by courtesy only, having been originally ice-chests, egg-crates and various other kinds of cases, but which the ingenuity of the owner has transformed into some kind of receptacle for clothing.

One is able to fairly well deduct the cause which placed the unfortunates in the asylum by a glance through these trunks. Here a trunk almost filled with bibles makes it plain that the person who owned it, became mentally unbalanced because of religious fervor. Another, from which several hypodermic syringes and needles rolled, as it was turned over, told only too plainly the truth that the one to whom they belonged had lost his reason through the use of morphine and other "dope." Some, of course, have their afflictions which do not appear in their belongings, or perhaps do appear in a peculiar manner, but which the ordinary observer is unable to judge. Among the clothing of one of the unfortunate inmates was found a wrapper made of thousands of different colored cloths. Another kept her clothing stuffed with hundreds of pieces of torn dresses.

It has been decided that the clothing being wasted by being stored away shall now be put to some use. The inmates will be clothed in such garments as they bring with them into the institution, and that which is still serviceable and the owners of which have died or left the asylum, will be given to the other patients.

A great quantity of the trunks and cases, which are falling apart from wear and old age, are to be destroyed after they have been passed upon by the board.
