Disagree on Statement No. 1—

H. A. Brattain, of Paisley, in his petition for nomination to the office of representative for the 21st district on the Republican ticket, filed with the secretary of state this morning states: "If elected I will vote for the Republican candidate for U. Wants Case Advanced—

Attorney-General Crawford this morning filed a petition in the supreme court asking that the case of the State against the Portland General Electric Company to compel an accounting to show how much is due the state on the 10 per cent of the net proceeds of the canal and locks at Oregon City, be heard at the earliest possible date so that before the bill, which is at present pending in congress for the buying of the waterway, is passed, it will be known whether the state has any interest in the canal for the \$200,000 placed in the project.

Oregon Electric Railway Company vs. Terwilliger Land Company; appeal from Judge Frazer; motion to retax costs denied.

Edward Winter vs. Union Fishermen's Co-Operative Packing Co.; appeal from Judge Sears; reversed.

Wm. H. Ireland vs. Albert J. Ward; appealed from Judge Harris, Lane county; affirmed.

Attorney-General Crawford moved the dismissal of four old cases that have hung fire for many years.
