HEARST TO BACK BRYAN

AGREEMENT MADE

HEARST'S PAPERS WILL SUPPORT NEBRASKAN IF HE WILL ACCEPT ATTORNEY-GENERAL JACKSON, OF NEW YORK, AS HIS RUNNING MATE—BRYAN IS MORE THAN WILLING.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 19.—An agreement whereby Hearst is willing to be represented on Bryan's ticket by William Schuyler Jackson, attorney-general of New York state, as the Nebraskan's running mate, is said to have been agreed upon as the result of several conferences between the New York editor and the "Commoner."

Report has it that Hearst will support the Bryan ticket with his papers if it carries Jackson as a candidate for the vice-presidency. Some of Bryan's closest friends say that he is willing to accept Jackson as a mate, and that he really favors him above any other timber that has been mentioned so far.

LAST OF HIS PUPILS. Sarah Minthorn, Who Was a Pupil of Marcus Whitman, Dead.

Pendleton, Feb. 19.—Sarah Minthorn, the last surviving Cayuse pupil of Marcus Whitman on his Mission School at Waiilatpu, died at the home of her son, Luke Minthorn, yesterday afternoon after an eventful career of over 80 years in the immediate vicinity of the Umatilla agency.

Indian Sarah was one of the pupils of the Whitman mission back in the early forties and up until the day of her death sang songs taught her by the missionary and remembered his kindly face and teachings vividly.

MANY JAPS ARE HELD AT VICTORIA

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 19.—Two steamers are about due from Yokohama, the Mingchow and Mont Eagle the former expected today and the latter on Saturday with Japanese, and unless they can pass the educational test made by the British Columbia government, these will be stopped, providing the Ottawa government has not disallowed the bill by that time.

On the Steamer Kaga-Aru, which sailed today for Yokohama, was ex-Consul Horikawa from Vancouver, who is taking with him copies of the new bill and full information for the Tokio government. There are also 125 Japanese quarantined at William Head, left by the Kaga Maru to be landed shortly, and these will also come under the new law.

THE THAWS WILL BE DIVORCED WHEN HE IS FREE

THE NOTORIOUS COUPLE HAVE AGREED TO SEPARATE AS SOON AS HE IS DECLARED SANE—SWIFT CAREER OF SEDUCTION, LECHERY AND MURDER ENDS IN DIVORCE.

New York, Feb. 19.—According to a story printed today in the New York World, Evelyn Thaw and her husband, now an inmate of Matteawan asylum, have positively agreed to part, that all that remains to be done before the suit for annulment of their marriage is begun is the completion of the terms of the financial settlement.

One report is that Evelyn demands more as a settlement than the Thaw family is willing to give, and that an agreement on this point is hard to reach. Attorney O'Reilly is said to be representing Mrs. Thaw in the matter and Attorney Peabody is acting for Thaw. Evelyn is said to be pleased with the progress that has been made so far in the arrangements looking to an annulment.

Mrs. William Thaw, mother of Harry Thaw, in an interview today declared that she will insist that her son must secure a divorce from his pretty wife.

"Harry has refused to listen to my advice," said Mrs. Thaw, "but until he does he must expect to be annoyed I am very sorry for my poor boy. He's brave, but so very foolish."

THIS SAUSAGE NOT APPETIZING

Chicago, Feb. 19.—Sausage made from horse meat is a luxury that has for some time been furnished to residents of Chicago Heights by J. J. Schmidt, grocer and sausage manufacturer, according to charges on which Schmidt has been arrested and bound over to the grand jury.

Suspicious residents of the suburban town were aroused by evidences that flesh was being cut from carcasses on the dump near the place, and from the fact that Schmidt was selling sausage at retail for half the price that he would have to pay for meat at wholesale.

RAWHIDE WILL BEAT GOLDFIELD

Reno, Feb. 19.—A large number of Reno capitalists have closed a deal involving \$40,000 for the purchase of Nathaniel Prosky's option on the Nicholson group at Rawhide.

M. W. Nicholson, who first arrived in the district a year ago, originally located the camp when there were only five persons in the camp. It is reported that a few Philadelphia capitalists, attracted by the story that a big silver and gold strike had been there, last night purchased from Van Dorn Bros. the townsite of Rawhide for \$600,000.

NEW STYLE OF TIMBER FRAUD.

Senator Tillman Denounces Pacific Lumber Syndicate for Crookedness.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Senator Tillman made the charge on the floor of the senate today that the St. Paul and Pacific lumber syndicate, of Portland, Or., is fraudulently using his name in circulars. He declared that he was in no way interested in the enterprise.

"I want to stop those rascals," Tillman said in announcing that he had asked the postoffice department to issue a fraud order. Senator Fulton also denounced the syndicate.

MUST GET OUT OF MANCHURIA

Washington, Feb. 19.—Attorney John B. Green, of New York, who is an authority on diplomatic affairs, declares that the object of the Atlantic fleets long cruise is to compel Japan to carry out its promise to evacuate Chinese territory in Manchuria. He added that the United States is bound to have trouble with the Mikado's government.

BLIZZARD SWEEPS OVER THE EAST

Chicago, Feb. 19.—Six deaths have already occurred, and others are expected as the result of one of the most severe and destructive blizzards that has ever visited the Middle West.

The storm has raged for two days, and street car and elevated road service in Chicago has been greatly crippled. Mrs. Anna M. Lincoln, 72 years of age, was found in a snow bank today, frozen to death. Two men were drowned from a fishing tug in the storm off Waukegan. Three other deaths are reported from localities near Chicago. Snow continues to fall today, and in some places it has drifted to a height of 12 feet. There is intense suffering among the poor.

New York, Feb. 19.—The blizzard that is causing so much suffering and damage in the West struck this city today. Four inches of snow have fallen in that many hours, and all traffic has practically been stopped. All boats on both rivers have been forced to tie up.

Rear Admiral Sperry.

Washington, Feb. 19.—The announcement was made today that Rear-Admiral Sperry, commanding the fourth division of Rear-Admiral Evans' fleet, has been selected to command the new Philippine station. He will assume the duties of his new post upon his arrival at the islands, and will have under him the warships Kentucky, Kearsarge, Illinois and Alabama.

ALL THE SAME
ROCKEFELLER.
Berlin, Feb. 19.—The imperial treasury department has under consideration a proposition to have the government establish a petroleum monopoly as a means of making up the deficit in the revenues. It is estimated that oil plants, tanks, cars, vessels and other property necessary for the oil business, would cost \$18,000,000, but that the government would make an annual profit of from \$10,000,000 to \$12,500,000.

TO BE GOVERNED BY COMMISSION

Des Moines, Ia., Feb. 19.—The Iowa supreme court yesterday upheld a constitutionality of the Des Moines plan of municipal government. This means that in the capital city of the state of Iowa the office of mayor and other city officials are abolished, as are the city council and all municipal boards.

The city will be governed by a commission of five men, just as the business of a bank is managed by directors. Technically one of the commissioners will be called mayor. A vote of 25 per cent of the legal voters may dismiss any or all the commissioners or compel them to stand for re-election. Ten per cent of the voters may compel the commission to pass any ordinance or submit any ordinance proposed by the commission to a popular vote.

HORACE MCKINLEY IN SAN FRANCISCO.
San Francisco, Feb. 19.—The steamer America Maru, with Horace McKinley, the famous Oregon fugitive, on board, was sighted shortly after noon today off the Farallones, 28 miles out. The vessel will dock late this evening.

JAPAN MAKES HER ANSWER

Tokio, Feb. 19.—American Ambassador Thomas J. O'Brien was today handed Japan's reply to America's memorandum of January 26, which sought a settlement of the emigration question.

The Mikado told the American ambassador that he thought the reply would be satisfactory to the United States and that he hoped it would end the present controversy. It is concluded that it assures nearly everything the memorandum asked for, allowing for restrictions that will certainly prove very effective.

EVANS WILL SOON RETIRE

Washington, Feb. 19.—It is stated that in all probability Rear-Admiral Evans will not preside over the destinies of the battleship squadron in its journey across the Pacific after arriving at San Francisco.

Admiral Evans will retire from the service on August 18, and, as the warships will start for Manila before that date, it is said he will turn over the command. It is reported in naval circles that the President has practically decided to elevate Captain Richard Wainwright to command.
