

# S. P. MEN GET SHORTER HOURS

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, Feb. 18.—Nine hours a day for train dispatchers, signal tower men and telegraph operators.

Sixteen hours a day for engineers, firemen, brakemen, conductors, yardmen and switchmen.  
This is the new scale of hours the Southern Pacific officials are arranging to put into effect on and after March 4, next. They are to do this in order to comply with a law passed by the last congress, which becomes operative on March 4, and which is interested in the Interstate Commerce Commission for enforcement.

On this coast Southern Pacific and Santa Fee employes to the number of 8000 will be effected by the change in hours. On the Harriman roads alone in the West 12,000 men will have their hours reduced. The change will be made without friction, because of the volume of business, especially for the traffic is unusually light at present, owing to the effects of the recent money stringency.
