

A NEW CHINESE BANKRUPTCY CODE

The following information regarding the Chinese bankruptcy code is transmitted by Consul Wilbur T. Gracey of Tsingtau: Recent local newspapers announced the appearance of an extremely useful little pamphlet containing a translation of the Chinese bankruptcy code of 1905, by Chang Nieh-Yun, with an editorial by a prominent solicitor in Shanghai, who is a well known authority on Chinese law. The editor points out that in 1905, when imperial assent was obtained for this code, it was a time when the cry of reform was loud and urgent, and the code, though containing the comparatively small number of 69 articles, as against the voluminous English bankruptcy enactments, makes a laudable step in the right direction by placing on record a set of rules to cover the insolvency of Chinese subjects and opening for them a way to clear themselves of their debts, instead of allowing them to merely languish in prison, possibly for years. The code was the work of certain Chinese students educated in Japan, and was revised by Wu Ting Fang, ex-vice president of the bureau of foreign affairs of China, also the first Chinese barrister at the English bar, who was recently appointed Chinese minister at Washington.

Death of Mrs. Julia Bean

In speaking of the death of Mrs. Julia A. Bean, mother of Justice Bean of the supreme court, the Eugene Register says: Mrs. Bean, whose maiden name was Sharp, was born near Newmarket, Harrison county, Ohio, February 25, 1838. In company with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Sharp, she started across the plains for Oregon in 1849, but reaching Missouri they purchased a farm and resided there three years. In May, 1852 they started for Oregon again, taking the Barlow route. Although they were hampered by sickness on the journey and were snowbound for a while they arrived safely in Oregon City on November 1, 1852. Spending the winter in Chehalem valley, they took up a ranch in Washington county in the spring but the land proved worthless and they came to Lane county in the fall of 1853. The subject of this sketch was married to Obadiah Bean in Yamhill county, Ore., on October 31, 1853, and to them 11 children were born, as follows: Robert S., judge of the supreme court of Oregon; James R., an express messenger running out of Portland; John W., a prominent physician of Tacoma; Mrs. Emma A. Lucas, of Aberdeen, Wash.; Joshua H., died in 1897; Edward A., book-keeper in the First National Bank of Eugene; Louis E., a prominent attorney of Eugene; Frederick, a hard ware merchant of Eugene; Mary, died when a year old; Chester O., a contractor at Aberdeen, Wash.; and Miss Estelle A. living at home. Mr. Bean died in the Siuslaw valley in 1890.

Mrs. Bean was an ideal wife and mother, a God-fearing woman, and her family of noble men and women attest her faithfulness in all that becomes a mother. Her memory will always be revered, not only by those nearest and dearest to her, but by all who enjoyed her acquaintance. The funeral services will be private and will be held on Friday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment made at the Masonic cemetery and the remains of her husband, who was buried on the Siuslaw, will be brought to Eugene and re-interred beside her, as soon as the condition of the roads will permit.
