INTERNATIONAL DEPRAVITY

White Girl and Two "Chinks" Placed Under Arrest at Roseburg.
Roseburg, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—A shocking example of moral depravity was revealed in Roseburg when Officer Norman arrested a white girl in a small house occupied by local Chinese and situated at the entrance to the alley on the north side of lower Douglas street. Two Chinamen, familiarly known as "We" and "Park" were also arrested at the same time. All three furnished bonds of \$100 to appear in Justice Long's court Monday for examination on a charge of lewd cohabitation.

The girl gave her name as Natella Cole, which she admitted was fictitious, and her age at 20 years. She made no attempt to deny her guilt. She says she arrived here from California on the 2nd of the month and ever since has been consorting with a number of local Chinamen. Only twice during that time, she says, did she leave the house and then only at night. She declared that the Chinamen were frequently visited by several girls of this city during her seclusion in the house.

FINED FOR KILLING DEER UNLAWFULLY

Glendale, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—W. W. Powers and S. G. Jones were arraigned before Justice C. T. Nail's court on charge of breaking the game laws. At the preliminary hearing Mr. Jones entered a plea of "not guilty" and his trial was held yesterday before a jury of Glendale citizens, at which time he admitted killing the deer and was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days in the county jail. Failing to raise this amount, he was taken to Roseburg last evening. Mr. Powers admitted having some of the venison, but declared that he had killed no deer. The law, however, not only prohibits killing, but also makes a man liable for having venison in his possession at this season, so Mr. Powers was fined \$25, which he paid.

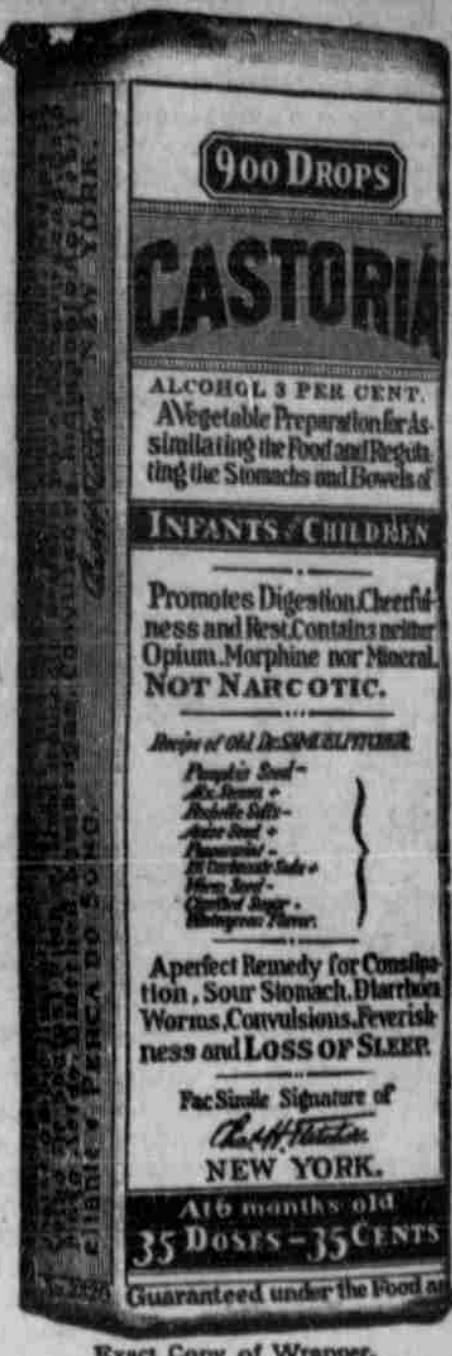
