PROMINENT DOCTOR

Says Pneumonia Weather Is Here and Cautions Against Common Colds.

Just at this particular season pneumonia is very prevalent (says one of our most prominent physicians) and considering the large percentage of deaths that result from it, being more fatal than smallpox, every one should use all precaution to avoid its malignant grip. The large majority of cases of pneumonia are the direct result of an acute or lingering cold, which most people consider trivial but which it is extreme folly to neglect.

The doctor also gives a prescription which he says is probably the most effective known to the profession for the quick relief of coughs, colds and throat troubles. It is as follows:

Two ounces of glycerine; half ounce Concentrated oil of pine; half pint first class whiskey; these to be mixed well and used in doses of a teaspoonful to a tablespoonful every four hours. The bottle is to be well shaken each time.

This simple preparation can be easily mixed at home, the ingredients being obtainable from any good drug store. Care should be taken to get only the real Concentrated oil of pine which always comes put up for medicinal use in half ounce vials inclosed in tin screw top cases. The bulk oils and the patent medicine imitations frequently put out in wooden boxes are to be avoided as they are dangerous.

VALDEZ GETS A TREMBLE

Valdez, Alaska, Feb. 27.—The most severe earthquake shock experienced in these parts since 1903 occurred Friday morning, the 14th, and since that time there has been a succession of smaller shakes. The heavy shock was at 1:30 a. m., February 14. It started with a steady long swing from north to south and terminated in a number of violent jerks. No damage was done to buildings, as they are all frame structures. The shock lasted nearly 30 seconds.

UNTAXED AMERICAN MILLIONS

Shipped to Europe to be Squandered on Unpronounceable Count for a Title for the Vanderbilt Girl.

New York, Feb. 27.—Two millions of the Vanderbilt fortune will be sent to Hungary for Countess Szechenyi, formerly Gladys Vanderbilt, who recently married Count Szechenyi. Attorneys representing the countess have applied to Comptroller Metz for a transfer of that amount in city bonds, which were left to her by her father.

Instead of the actual transfer being made, a formal transfer paper signed by the mayor and comptroller of New York will be forwarded to the countess' banker in Buda Pest. Seventy thousand dollars, representing 3 1/2 per cent, will also be sent there. The bonds will be held in her name.

BODY IS HELD FOR EMBALMING EXPENSES.

San Francisco, Feb. 27.—The body of Lorenzo Sodoni, an Italian, who died Sunday night at St. Joseph's hospital, is being held at the undertaking rooms of Julius Godeau, as security for \$15 embalming expenses, while the dead man's friends refuse to pay the sum, and demand that the body be removed to their parlors. They claim that Godeau got possession of the body illegally, and say they will carry the matter into the courts. Already the Italian consul has been appealed to, and he has ordered the body removed.

CHICAGO PROFITS BY THE BIG CONVENTIONS.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—That the people who have been attracted to Chicago by the various conventions during the year left \$8,800,000 in this city is the claim of the convention bureau of the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Charles Stevens, chairman of the bureau, has made a report on the result of 245 conventions practically secured by the association. He says the bureau brought to Chicago in 1907 276,000 visitors, and that each one remained an average of four days, and that not one of them spent less than \$3 a day.
