EVELYN THAW IS FROZEN

ROMANCE IS DEAD

GOING TO EUROPE ON AN AL- LOWANCE NEVER TO RETURN TO HER CONVICTED HUSBAND ANY MORE—TAKES ADVANT- AGE OF HIS CONVICTION.

 New York, Feb. 28.—The Thaw romance is smash'd. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw today dropped all pretense of self-sacrificing devotion to Thaw in his asylum, and moved out of the house on Park avenue, where she has lived since the first trial.

This means that she will go to Europe at once, it is stated, positively, with an allowance of \$15,000 a year, never to return, and never to see Thaw again. For two weeks she has not gone to Matteawan to see him, and it is understood all relations between them are broken off.

Young Mrs. Thaw admitted that her plans for the future were very "uncertain."

"I had hoped the newspapers would forget me," said she.

One of the guards at Matteawan said that Thaw quarreled violently with his wife on the occasion of her last visit. This was two weeks ago, and she has made no attempt to visit her husband since.

It is reported that shortly after Mrs. Thaw arrives in Europe proceedings will be begun for the annulment of the marriage, the young wife making no contest in return for the annuity provided her.

Bradley, Republican, has practically won the fight.

The Democrats supporting Beck- ham attempted to break the quorum, but were not successful. If the vote is not changed Bradley will be the second Republican in the history of Kentucky who ever represented that state in the senate. The vote today was taken amid scenes of turmoil.

NUTMEG STATE ABSCONDER

During his plea in Walker's be- half, to have declared ineffective and void the extradition papers, Senior Ramirez demanded that the former bank cashier be granted his liberty upon the grounds that Walk- er had been under arrest more than 40 days before he was served with extradition papers.

SURPRISE FOR LAND GRAFTER

IS LANDED AT LAST

SMOOTH WORKER WHO HAS FILLED THE NEWSPAPERS FOR YEARS IS AT LAST TO LAND BEHIND THE BARS—ALL THAT SUCCEEDS IS NOT SUCCESS BY ANY MEANS.

 Portland, Or., Feb. 28.—Horace G. McKinley, the noted land fraud agent, who was recently brought back to Portland from Mukden, Manchuria, where he had escaped from the federal authorities, after conviction on the charge of con- spiracy, was sentenced to two years in prison and a fine of \$7500 this

morning by Judge Wolverton, of the federal court. The extent of the sentence was a surprise, as it was generally believed in Portland that McKinley had made certain immunity arrangements with Heney by which he was to exchange his testimony for a light sentence.

FACTORY EGGS ARE COMING

 Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 28.—Heretofore the belief has been general that "eggs is eggs." They are not. They're vegetable compound, and arrangements have been made to man- ufacture them in this city.

This new "hen fruit" is declared to equal the fresh egg for all pur- poses, and it can be placed on the market which will compel the real eggs to come down to seven cents a dozen, if they are to compete with it. A company has been formed to manufacture these vegetable eggs here, and expects to invest \$35,000 in special patented machinery, and supply the trade within a few months.

A CALIFORNIA STYLE NOT CATCHING HERE

CHINESE MINISTER ARRIVES

GIVEN A RECEPTION

GREAT PREPARATIONS FOR THE PARADE OF BATTLESHIPS AT THE GOLDEN GATE—ADMIRAL DEWEY AND SECRETARY OF THE NAVY METCALF WILL AT- TEND THE DISPLAY AT SAN FRANCISCO.

 San Francisco, Feb. 28.—Wu Ting Fang, recently reappointed Chinese minister to the United States, ar- rived this morning on the steamship Siberia, accompanied by an elaborate suite. A delegation of prominent Americans and Chinese merchants boarded the Siberia when the vessel

came out of quarantine, and extend- ed a formal welcome to the distin- guished Chinese.
 The statement to the effect that he desired the presence of Secretary Root and objected to that of Sec- retary Metcalf, of the navy, at the time of the arrival of the fleet, was de- nied this morning by Frank J. Symmes, of the fleet reception com- mittee.
 "On the contrary," Symmes de- clared, "we have already sent the in- vitations to Admiral Dewey and Sec- retary Metcalf, and they have ac- cepted, but we wanted President Roosevelt and Secretary Root as well, but we have not much hopes that the President and Secretary Root will be able to come."

REDUCE HOURS NOT SALARY

 Spokane, Wash., Feb. 28.—The railway telegraphers have received notice this morning that the nine- hour schedule had been accepted by the Northern Pacific without any re- duction in wages. The minimum stands, which means about \$75 as an average per month. The company reserves the right to work split tricks, which means that a man may be worked an hour and then ex- ceased an hour if not busy. By this means he may be able to handle small stations, as under the old ar- rangement, but the plan will not work at stations of any importance. This action on the part of the rail- road abolishes any possibility of a strike.

HEARST WANTS TO HARNES WITH TEDDY

 The story is that Hearst would take President Roosevelt into his confidence and offer him first place on the Independence League ticket. Even against the President's will, some say, Hearst intends to have his league nominate him, if Taff and Bryan are nominated by the other two parties. By this move the league thinks it would be able to split up the two older parties.

PERSIA RULER BOMBED

THREE WERE SLAIN

THIRD ATTEMPT TO TAKE THE LIFE OF ORIENTAL DESPOT— HIS ATTENDANTS SLAUGHT- ERED BY THE EXPLOSION. BUT THE PRINCIPAL OWES HIS LIFE TO THE AUTOMO- BILE.

 Teheran, Persia, Feb. 28.—In a de- perate but unsuccessful attempt to kill the Shah today three outriders were killed and many soldiers wounded.

While the Shah was riding through the streets in his automo- bile a bomb was hurled at him, but he escaped. Soldiers who were guard- ing him were knocked from their feet, and the three outriders who were killed were close to the ruler's automobile. The identity of the man who threw the bomb is not known.

Shah in Closed Auto.

The Shah owes his life to a closed automobile that preceded the one in which he was riding. Had he been in the first car, which was used as a precautionary measure, he would have been torn to pieces by the explosion. The assassins took a position on the roof of a building, and waited for the ruler to pass. Think- ing that he was riding in the closed automobile, the assassins hurled the bombs at it. One exploded in the air just above the car, and the second fell under it. The machine was blown into hundreds of pieces.
 When the first explosion occurred the chauffeur driving the Shah, sud- denly stopped, turned the car around and made a dash for the palace. Scores of pedestrians were thrown from their feet by the force of the explosions, and 21 of them were in- jured.
 In the excitement that followed the assassins climbed from roof to roof and escaped, although the police were on their trail.

Washington, Feb. 28.—The state department has received a cable an- nouncing the attempt to kill the Shah. In the dispatch Minister Jackson says several persons were killed. He confirms the report that the ruler escaped unhurt.
