NEWS BUDGET.
Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 28.—The Whitman college council met in Reynolds hall last week, the principal business being the discussion of the plans for the "New Whitman." Dean Hendrick, who has charge of the campaign for the new endowment, was the speaker of the evening. The plans are prospering, and it seems an assured fact that the enterprise that was launched so boldly last December will be successful in every way.

Won Easy on Debate.
Whitman college was an easy victor in the triangular debate last week between Whitman, Pacific and Willamette university. Three debates were held the same night, one at each institution. In Walla Walla Whitman won a unanimous decision over Willamette. Whitman's speakers being Frank Fletcher, L. M. Livengood and Calvin Crumbaker. In Forest Grove Whitman won 2 to 1 over Pacific, being represented by R. W. Rigby, Walter C. Eells, and Harry Davenport. In Salem Pacific beat Willamette. Thus Willamette lost two debates, Pacific broke even and Whitman won two. The question in all the debates was Japanese exclusion.

New Athletic Rules.
